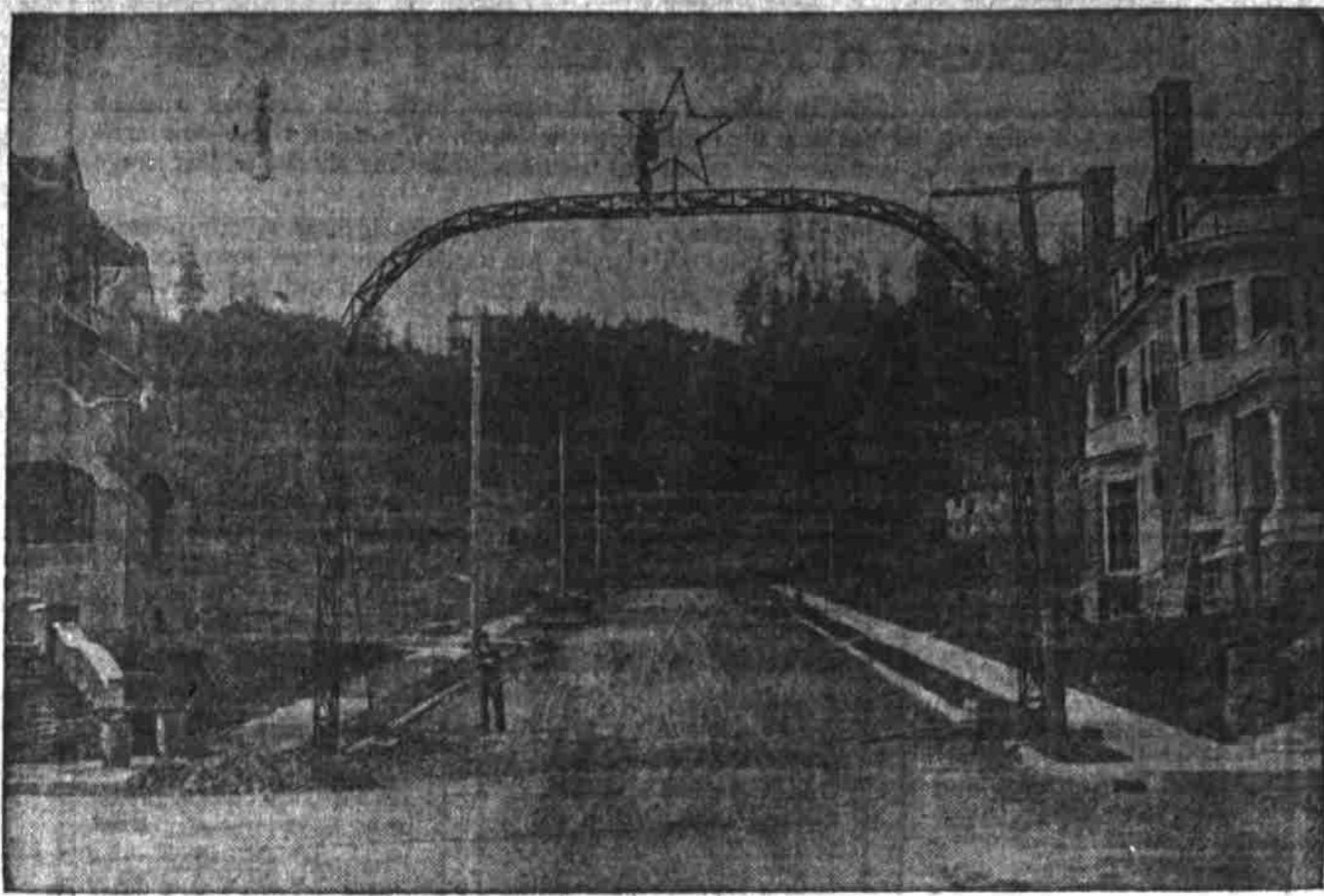


FIRST ROSE FESTIVAL ARCH COMPLETED

INITIATIVE MEASURES TO BE VOTED ON--NO. 14

The fourteenth in the list of 19 proposed initiative and referendum measures has to do with the instruction of legislators on the senatorial question. The form in which it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION A bill for a law instructing members of the legislature to vote for and elect the candidates for United States senator who receive the highest number of votes at the general election. Vote YES or NO. 326. Yes. 327. No. The bill as it has been submitted to the people is as follows: "A bill to propose by initiative petition a law to instruct the members of the legislative assembly to vote for and elect the candidates selected by the people for United States senator from Oregon. Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon: "Section 1. That we, the people of the state of Oregon, hereby instruct our representatives and senators in our legislative assembly, as such officers, to vote for and elect the candidates for

LABOR UNIONS WILL SUPPORT VARSITY BILL

Executive Board Passes Resolution Urging State Bodies to Act.

The executive board of the State Federation of Labor has passed a resolution urging labor union men in all parts of the state to support the University of Oregon appropriation bill. There are 68 affiliated labor organizations in Oregon, and all of them have been notified of the action of the State Federation. When seen yesterday, President C. H. Gram spoke in highest terms of the university and its work and said that he was heartily in favor of giving the school the \$25,000 per year, in order that the state may have an institution worthy of her name. The action of the State Federation is merely a recommendation but it will doubtless be followed by a majority of the labor union men. Friends of the university are highly elated over the federation's action. It is said that Eugene Palmer of Albany, who is engineering the movement against the bill, addressed the Federated Trades Council last Friday night and urged that body to vote against the pending bill. The fact that no action was taken by the Federated Trades Council is cited by the friends of the university as proof that labor union men are in sympathy with the effort to withhold the funds of the university.

BAKER PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO CHARGE

Although not yet placed under arrest, Robert Baker has waived arraignment and pleaded not guilty to a statutory charge against him in the circuit court. His bail was also fixed, so that when the warrant is taken by the Federated Trades Council it will be complete and the case will be ready to set for trial. It was in Baker's case that Judge Cleland recently sustained a demurrer to the information. The court held that the title of the act was not sufficient, in view of the body of the act, as to the particular crime charged, which was a felony. A new information was then filed, charging Baker with a misdemeanor, and it was to this information that the plea was entered yesterday, although Baker had not yet been placed under arrest.

Salmon Kills Woman. (United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, April 4.—Mrs. Sadie Hansen, 21 years old, and her two small children, ate canned salmon and were seized with convulsions. Antidotes saved the children. Mrs. Hansen died at Saint Anthony's hospital of ptomaine poisoning.

FRANCE SCARED BY ART JOKERS

Painters Hang Caricatures of European Sovereigns in Paris Salon.

Special Cable to Journal. Paris, France, April 4.—The Paris authorities are bothered to death by the sense of humor displayed among the exhibitors at the Salon Des Artistes Independents. Six caricatures of European sovereigns were smuggled into the present display and all of them were of a kind which would have driven the subjects wild with indignation had they seen them. Czar Nicholas and Kaiser William were the chief sufferers. Berlin had a celebration not long ago in memory of the revolutionists killed in the uprising of 1874. The picture in question represented Emperor William standing in front of the martyrs' monument. He wears mourning. His head is bowed

with apparent grief. Wreaths and immortelles are piled lavishly around him—knee deep. But on his majesty's face a smile appears—about a foot wide. This shocked Paris exceedingly. The authorities did not hear about the offensive pictures until they had been several days on exhibition. Then a police commissary and a squad of detectives hastened to the gallery, muffled the canvasses reverently in cloaks and drove away with them in cabs. Such foolishness might result in international complications and the authorities cannot understand why the hanging committee let the artists "get away with it." What makes it worse, this is not the first time such a thing has happened. Henri Rousseau got a dreadful picture of the "Jus Jitsu" into the gallery last year. There was a ring, in the center the czar and the mikado strove together. In a group surrounding the enclosure stood all the royalties of the old world looking on. Not a person in the party had on clothes enough to "fias a streetcar."

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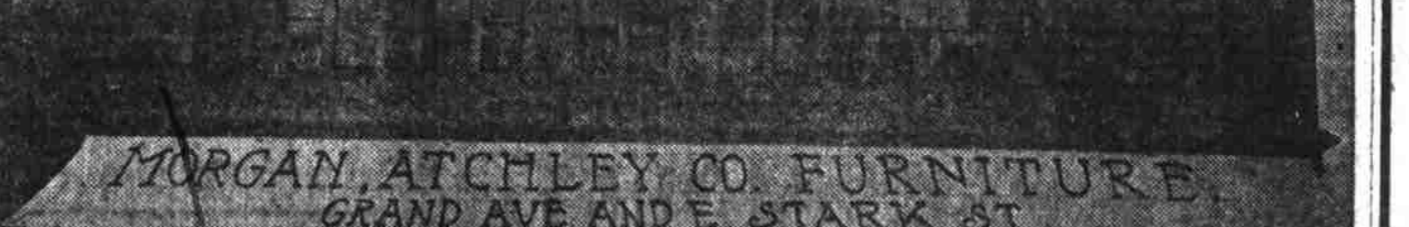
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
