Republican County Central Committee Lays Snare for Peace—Defeated Candidates Must Pledge Support to Successful Rivals.

Harmony must come and the white-winged bird of peace must place the olive branch over the gaping wounds of party strife, according to the dictum of the executive committee of the Republican city and county central committee of Multnomah county. All candidates for nomination on the Republican ticket must come to the fore with a written pledge to the central committee and the voters of the county by which they each agree to bury the post-primary hatchet and work for the success of the nominees. This was decided upon at a meeting of the executive committee held yesterday afternoon and a pledge was drawn up all ready for the candidates to sign.

The meeting of the executive committee was called yesterday to pay some of the political debts of the organization but after the bills were audited and ordered paid other things came up for discussion. It was then that the candidates' pledge idea was brought up for discussion.

It had been decided some time ago that the candidates should pledge themselves to stand by the successful nominees but yesterday the question came up for further discussion. It was decided that all men who come out for office and asked the people to vote for them should stand by the voice of their party members. It was argued that a defeated candidate was by duty bound to turn about after the primaries and whoop-it-up for the man who beat him.

In line with this belief it was ordered that a pledge be drafted and prepared for every candidate on the Republican ticket to sign. This draft was prepared and it is expected that all Republican candidates will come into camp within the next few days and take the pledge.

Failure to sign the pledge required by the central committee will throw the candidate so neglecting into danger of encountering the opposition of the central committee during the remainder of the campaign. The committee will favor the candidacy of all those who sign the pledge but it will frown upon any candidate who refuses to put his name after the magic promise.

Incidentally, the executive committee has gone on record for the candidacy of William H. Taft for president. At the meeting of yesterday a resolution was adopted endorsing Mr. Taft and pledging him the support of the members of the executive committee prior to the coming state convention of the Republican party, which has been tentatively set down for June 12.

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PAID SHERIFF TO SPIRIT AWAY MURDER WITNESSES

Three weeks ago Sheriff R. R. Veale, of Contra Costa county, California, came to Portland as the paid agent of a member of that faction of the Bow On Tong that is held responsible for the murder of Lee Dai Hoy, the wealthy Chinese merchant shot down on his own doorstep at 270 Pine street four weeks ago.

Three days ago Sheriff Veale came to Portland with warrants for the arrest of the three witnesses upon whom the local authorities depend for testimony with which to convict the two Chinese now under arrest and charged with the commission of the murder of Lee Dai Hoy.

Sheriff Veale admits that he was privately paid on the occasion of his first visit; that he accompanied a Chinese interpreter known as "Jake"; that the occasion of his visit was business in connection with the murder of Lee Dai Hoy; that Jake is alleged with the faction of the Bow On Tong held responsible for the murder; and that at the time he was not acting as the chief peace officer of Contra Costa county, California, but as a private citizen under pay of a faction of a Chinese society that had already caused the murder of one wealthy and prominent Portland Chinese merchant and marked three others for slaughter.

Intends Taking Chinese. Sheriff Veale denies that there is any connection between his visit here three weeks ago and his reappearance armed with warrants for the arrest of the state's principal witnesses against the men charged with the murder of Lee Dai Hoy.

"One of my deputies will arrive here tomorrow morning," he said yesterday, "with requisition papers for the three Chinese who were arrested Thursday afternoon and later released on an order from District Attorney Manning."

"I am going ahead," continued the sheriff, "and use every expedient I know of to get possession of these men and take them back to California with me. No, I am not going to employ any counsel on my own account, but I suppose the Chinese society that is interested in the prosecution of the three men I am after will have a lawyer on hand when the matter comes before the governor. I have reason to believe that Attorney F. F. Freeman will be on hand when the requisition papers are presented."

Attorney Freeman is the lawyer retained by the friends of the men accused of the murder of Lee Dai Hoy to defend them before the local courts.

The three Chinese for whose arrest Sheriff Veale holds warrants from the superior court of Contra Costa county, California, are Chen Huak, one of the wealthiest merchants in Chinatown, and Lem Yip and Go Ying Yuen. The two men last named saw the murderers of Lee Dai Hoy running away from the scene of the killing and pointed them out to the police. Chen Hung has a complete knowledge of the formation of the conspiracy to murder and the dispatch of the murderers from the headquarters of the Bow On Tong in San Francisco. He, with Lee Dai Hoy, was among the four Chinese merchants placed on the death list when the murder edict was issued.

The Chinese who swears to the complaint against them is secretary of the San Francisco Bow On Tong, the organization that ordered the killing of the Portland Chinese. The charge is obtaining money by false pretenses.

WIFE'S BEER BOTTLE WAS AIMED AT HIS EYE AND HIT THE SPOT

Charging that his wife blackened his eye with a beer bottle when he tried to remonstrate with her concerning the company she kept, Arthur A. Schanz has begun suit in the circuit court for divorce from Evelyn Schanz. He says the blow with the bottle was dealt in the Barton rooming house on March 15, and he remonstrated because he found her in company with another man.

LOSES BULLET HE CARRIED 18 YEARS

Schanz also alleges that his wife deserted him in November, 1905. They were married in February, 1902. He says his wife has too frequently been seen in company with Sidney Wallace, but does not name the third party in the beer bottle affair. He says his wife took their three-year-old child from the custody of his mother, and he asks the court to award the little one to him when the case is heard.
