

### DETECTIVES SEEK LUCILE MANARD

#### Her Father Alleges Her Mother a Kidnaped and Fickle Besides.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Seattle, Wash., April 6.—Detectives are scouring this city in search of Lucile Manard, five years old, who was kidnapped a year after she had been taken away from her mother by her father, S. T. Manard, who claims to have discovered that C. E. Laing had alienated his wife's affections. Manard has sworn to complaints against his wife and Laing.  
He will in addition charge S. T. Russell, father of Mrs. Manard, and Mrs. Manard, jointly, with kidnapping the child.  
Manard placed his daughter in the hands of Mrs. S. J. Palmer. A year later on a day when there was no one in the house except Mrs. Palmer, her 16-year-old daughter and the child, the football was thrown. When Mrs. Palmer opened the door Mrs. Manard and Russell walked in. The child ran away frightened. Russell, according to Mrs. Manard, chased the child into the kitchen and seized her under his right arm. His left arm he kept in his coat pocket as if clutching a revolver.  
Holding the child under his arm and keeping the other hand in his coat pocket, Russell accompanied by Mrs. Manard, went out at the front door the little girl screaming and scratching her captor's face in protest.  
Both Manard and Laing are railroad men and had friends. Laing is an express messenger running on the Northern Pacific between Seattle and Spokane. When in Portland he lives with a sister. During the last six months, while in this city between shifts, he had a room at the Manard home.  
Divorce proceedings were begun in the superior court Saturday by Manard. A petition was also entered asking that the court allow a charge of kidnaping to be filed against Mrs. Manard and her father.

### WORKMEN WILL ORGANIZE PARTY

#### Haywood Declares Effort Will Be Made to Elect Union President.

Chicago, April 6.—"Five hundred thousand workers will enter the presidential campaign as a solid unit and try to elect a working-class candidate," declared William D. Haywood, secretary-treasurer of the Western Federation of Miners, tonight. His announcement was caused by a dispatch from the executive board of his organization, informing him that preparations for the consolidation of 400,000 members of labor unions have been adopted by half of the largest organizations in the country. Haywood continued:  
"If a spur to the workers was wanted, Secretary W. H. Taft furnished it in his recent speech for a larger army for use in case of internal trouble. Taft and other such politicians will soon learn that labor is becoming too intelligent and is too humane to resort to violence to meet violence. The ballot-box is the weapon labor will use. Already the amalgamation of the United Mine Workers, the Western Federation of Miners, the United Brewery Workers of America, carriage-workers, shoemakers, bakers and confectionery and other organizations, numbering more than 400,000 members, is certain before the election. A meeting will be held next week of the representatives of the unions to formulate plans. The founding of the new labor party may be postponed for a short time but it is assured within a few months. We will form a federation of labor that will not send lobbyists to the legislature to beg for office that they never get but elect men to office to have what we are entitled to."  
Representatives of the unions will meet Monday to adopt a plan for organization.

### LINN FACES SECOND LOCAL OPTION FIGHT

#### Liquor Interest Circulating Petition and It is Estimated They May Secure Resubmission.

Albany, Or., April 6.—A petition is being circulated in Linn county asking to have the liquor question resubmitted to a vote of the people. Under the law whenever a petition signed by not less than 10 per cent of the registered voters of any county shall be filed with the county clerk, the county court shall order an election to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited.  
The registration of the county at the last election was about 100,000. Based on the estimate on the vote cast for supreme judge a total of over 400 petitions will be necessary. There is little question about the ability of the petitioners to obtain the number required. This will insure a fight and the friends of prohibition will again be obliged to rally.

### RIVAL TOWNS FIGHT ON SCHOOL MATTERS

Pendleton, Or., April 6.—Rivalry between Milton and Freewater, which has extended into school matters, has culminated in a petition being filed with the superintendent of Umatilla county schools, Frank K. Wells, asking that Freewater district be set apart as a separate school district. Representatives of the Freewater district have appeared before the superintendent from all reports the matter will be hard fought. It is reported that there is considerable opposition among Milton people to the proposed separation, and the matter gives promise of complicating the already strained relations between Milton and Freewater. It is understood that a special election will be called on the division question.

### Cost of Pendleton Light.

### PLAY THE GAME FOR GOV. JOHNSON

#### Boomers in Minnesota Use Special Delivery to Aid Their Candidate.

### TEN DAYS' CHASE FOR ALLEGED HORSETHIEF

#### It Ends in the Arrest of William Wilson at Jefferson—Missing Animal Recovered.

Salem, Or., April 6.—After a 10 days' chase over the state for William Wilson, an alleged horsethief, Sheriff John Connelly of Yamhill county, assisted by Sheriff Culver of Marion county, caught his man at Jefferson yesterday.  
Ten days ago, a Yamhill county farmer reported the theft of a valuable named "Wheat" and a pair of colts. Sheriff Connelly, who learning that the latter had gone to Hillsboro several days before immediately went to that town and arrested the thief. Wilson had left several days before. From Hillsboro the chase led to Portland, to Oregon City, to Markham and then to this city.  
Sheriff Connelly immediately on his arrival here notified Sheriff Culver and word was sent broadcast to peace officers in the surrounding towns, with the result that word was received from Jefferson that the much sought man was there. Connelly and Culver went to Jefferson and ended the long pursuit, placing Wilson under arrest and seizing the horse.

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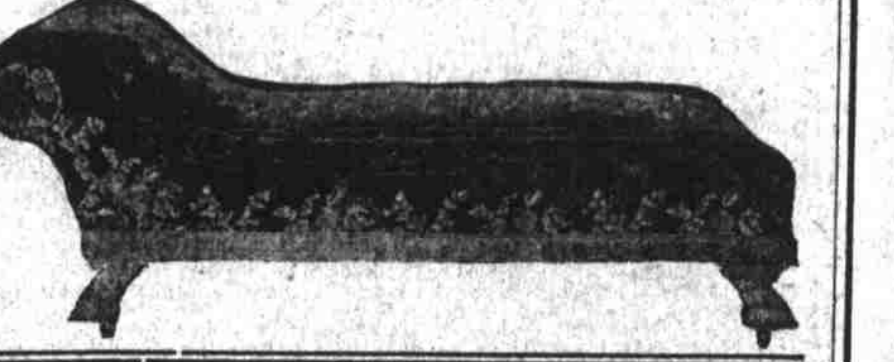
