FLEET IN GOOD TRIM

Gunners Equal Last Year's Records Notwithstanding Number of Green Men—Admiral Evans Continues to Show Improvement.

San Diego, Cal., April 7.—Not a single serious accident; last year's records equaled or excelled all along the line. That was the highly satisfactory result of the target practice just completed by the 15 battalions of the Atlantic Fleet at Magdalena Bay.
There were many green men among the gun pointers and trainers who took part in the shooting; men who had never stood behind a gun in action before this cruise began. The outlook was not promising. The results were correspondingly more gratifying. The way these new men tore up the targets with hot steel missiles was most pleasing. The greatest interest centered in the work of the new long 12-inch guns of the connecting type. Much was expected of them, and they did not disappoint. While scores are not given out, it may be said with no violation of confidence that the results attained by these new and very handsome pieces of ordnance cannot fail to be most gratifying to the department at Washington.
Much comment was caused by the unexpectedly good work done by some of the super-imposed turret, particularly those on the Georgia, whose after turret crew during the 4-inch gun in salvo on the same run with the 12, made a score which has won the navy prize for this class of turrets—a reward of some \$1,000, to be divided among the turret crew.
