

DOG AND HOUND IN SNOWS OF NORTH

Dawson Party of Five Mushes 56 Days Without a Single Mishap.

Seattle, April 7.—A Dawson dispatch, under date of March 14, says: Shaggy as Esau, muskies like gladiators, and as tough as sawhides, five men, trudging behind 20 dogs dragging five toboggans, fled through the streets of Dawson this morning, fresh from the sternmost rim of the earth. It was the Fort Macpherson patrol of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police.

The men left here 30 days ago, the day after Christmas, traveled 31 days, bound northward to Macpherson, remained there 24 days, and returned 56 days returning. All told they were mushing 56 days.

Every man came back in the pink of condition, but four of the dogs were missing. One died from the snow, and the teams and returned from a point 200 miles out on the trail from the trying work, and were left along the route.

The skookum fellows who made the trip are: Constable W. J. D. Dempster, in charge; Constable A. L. Simons; Special Constable Sydney Forrest, a trail guide; Special Constable Darrell, and John Martin, Indian, trail breaker.

The men started with 1,500 pounds of food and other supplies. This lasted them until well near the end of the outgoing journey with no other replenishment than one caribou, killed half way over. On the return not one caribou or other big animal was secured. There was no suffering from want of food either going or coming, and the men were in vigorous exercise put muscle and flesh on the men so that some of them, notwithstanding their hard toil of 20 to 25 miles a day through the snow with the snow shoes or behind the toboggans, returned weighing as much as when they left, and some even weighed more.

The route was via the Mackenzie, thence down the Blackstone, thence across the Little Hart and the Big Hart, thence down the Little Wind and the Big Wind, thence across the big partage of the Peel, down the Trail river, thence down the Peel to Macpherson. The same route was followed on the return, and is the same as taken last year.

The snow was very deep, and there was considerable water on the river trails. The trail was thus less favorable than last year, and not quite as good times was made.

The Edmonton packet, run for the government from post to post down the Mackenzie under contract by the Hudson Bay company, arrived at Macpherson the day before the Dawson patrol started back. The Dawson boys waited there 20 days for the connections with the packet. The packet was about 40 days making Macpherson, as compared to the 31 by the Dawson patrol. The Edmonton packet carries many way posts, whereas the Dawson patrol serves only Herschel and Macpherson.

The police patrol from Herschel had arrived at Macpherson before the Dawson patrol. The Herschel mail as well as the Macpherson mail, was brought out by the Dawson patrol and Edmonton mail was taken on Macpherson by the Macpherson-Herschel police. The party includes Captain Jarvis, formerly of Dawson, in charge; Constable Kinney and Special Constable Louis Cardinal. Sergeant Fitzgerald and Constable Carter are stationed at Herschel. The steam whaler Karluk, Captain Potter, is the only vessel at Herschel this winter. Captain Mogg, with the Olga, went farther to the eastward as the winter set in.

There was a rumor of diphtheria at the mouth of the Mackenzie, but this proved incorrect. The only case of diphtheria at all at Macpherson and Herschel was fairly good.

CITY HALL SOON FOR PENDLETON

Bids for \$35,000 Building to Be Opened in Council Tomorrow Night.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., April 7.—The Pendleton city council will open bids tomorrow evening for the construction of a modern city hall to cost \$35,000. Work under the proposed contract will begin in 10 days. The plans drawn by T. F. Howard, a local architect, have been accepted. The city has on hand \$30,000 for building purposes. The new building will be as nearly fireproof as it is possible to make it.

All of the city officers will have rooms on the ground floor. The council chamber and firemen's headquarters will be on the second floor. A jail will be located in the rear on the ground floor. A heating plant will be installed in the basement, while rooms for supplies and fuel will be provided.

EXPERTS TO LOOK AT TULE OUTLET

Reclamation Service Engineers Will Settle Question of Drainage.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., April 7.—Engineers D. C. Henry and D. W. Murphy of the reclamation service, will go to Tule lake this week, to investigate the alleged opening that is presumed to drain the lake.

A camp has been established all winter on the southern shore of the lake, and owing to the good winter weather, excavations were made under the supervision of Frank Adams, until the story weather in March, when the work was discontinued, and now will not be resumed until after the government engineers make their report.

An opening was made, 30 feet wide, 15 feet deep, and 40 feet long, through the bottom of which a small stream of water trickled. The real outlet, however, is supposed to be what is called the blowhole, leading towards the lava bed. This opening is filled with a shell formation of like character with the lake bed, and is presumed to have been deposited there years ago, as the shells are found above the present surface of the water, and are yellow, as if with age, while those in the lake are white.

Mr. Adams is still firmly of the opinion that through a series of years his deposit was made in the outlet and the water with an opening can be found that will aid materially in draining Tule lake, and the rich tules lands adjacent.

PENDLETON WILL FIX SEWERS AND LEVEES

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., April 7.—The city is preparing to spend \$10,000 in extending the sewer system and \$17,000 for constructing levees on the Umatilla river. Floods two years ago necessitated the enlargement of the levee districts and the high water three weeks ago caused considerable damage to old levees. As soon as possible the work will begin, money being on hand to pay for all necessary extensions and repairs.

GOOD YEAR FOR KLAMATH CANALS

Engineers Predict Great Progress—Indian and Tule Land Matters.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., April 6.—Supervising Engineer Henry and Consulting Engineer Quinton of the federal reclamation service state that this is a good year for the service, and that much work in all sections will be done. Contracted arid lands on all work despite Klamath's present transportation difficulties. Two bids have been received on the South Branch canal, one by Mather & Co. of Winnemucca, Nevada, at \$75,387, and the other by Sweeney Bros. of San Francisco at \$94,501. It will be necessary to submit to Secretary Garfield, although the recommendation lies with engineers here on the ground. Messrs. Henry and Quinton went over the work on the Keno canal, where a large force is now employed. They state that bids on the Cleek Lake dam will be opened at Portland, April 12. The engineers were especially pleased with the harmony between land owners and reclamation officials.

Klamath Reservation Plans. Engineer E. B. Henry has returned to his home in Klamath Falls after spending the winter on the Klamath Indian reservation on survey work for the proposed reclamation project that will reclaim 99,000 acres of reservation land. Mr. Henry did the survey work when the first allotments were made to the Indians, and he is thoroughly acquainted with the lands on the reservation. The plans for reclamation will be submitted to the interior department, and if approved the actual work of construction will give work to the young Klamaths for a number of years. Just what disposition will be made of the reclaimed land is not known.

Experiment Farm on Tules. Engineer Goodwin and party of the reclamation service, have been having strenuous work for the past week, clearing the site for the interior department farm, among the tules near Wild Horse butte. A tract of tule land has been leased on a long term from Abel Ady, who owns large areas of swamp land, adjacent to the grade of the California Northeastern railway. The work of reclaiming this tract has been delayed on account of the slow progress of the railroad company in building the grade, but this is now nearly completed, and the government engineers have been cutting and burning the tules preparatory to drainage. Supervising Engineer Henry states that the agricultural department will probably not use over 40 to 50 acres of the farm at present, but that the experiment station will be carried on perhaps for 20 years, in order to fully demonstrate what can be done with the reclaimed marsh land. This land is known to be among the richest in the world on account of the vegetable deposit that has been going on for years. By the time the immense tracts of swamp lands that are a part of the Klamath project are reclaimed, the experiment station will have proceeded far enough in its work to learn how the drained land should be treated.
