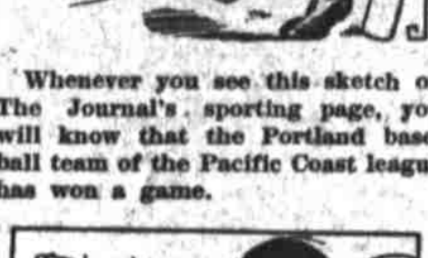

There will be four events open to the academic schools—50-yard dash and high hurdles, 220-yard dash and the relay race. Dart, the West Side High school man, looks to be the best man in the 50-yard dash, but Ben of Eugene, short of Astoria, Campbell of Columbia and Huston of Hill are all good men and should make a fine race.

The 220-yard dash will be the try-out meet, but fell going over the last hurdle. Starker, Eugene High, is a very fast man and will make McGuire hustle if he expects to capture the place.

West Side High school feels confident that their team will capture the relay race. Dart, Briedwell and Latourrette make a fast combination.

The 50-yard hurdles will furnish the best race of the day in the new trial and they hope to bring an end to the 1908 series by putting over another this week-end. Should California win, the third deciding game will, according to the new agreement entered into last January, be played on the California campus, on the morning of April 25.

It was quite evident last Saturday that the outcome depended on the opposing pitchers and the same will probably be true of this Saturday.
