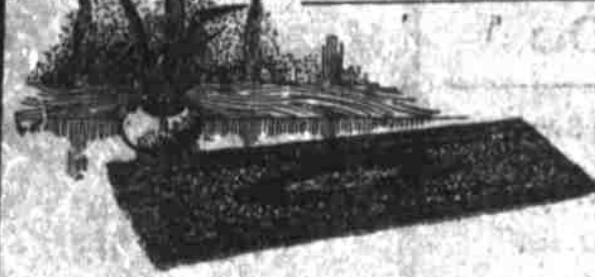

MAYOR RODGERS' ORDINANCE GOES

Salem to Lay High License Everywhere, and Penalties to Match.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., April 10.—The city council last night passed a new liquor ordinance, which is one of the most advanced in existence and probably the only one on the Pacific coast which has certain latter-day reform improvements. The ordinance sets a license upon practically every place where liquor is sold. These licenses are as follows: Saloons, \$400; beer halls, \$400; clubs, \$100; wholesale liquor dealers, \$100; restaurants, \$300; drugists, \$100.

The most stringent of restrictions are placed on saloons, which are to be limited to one to every 1,000 persons. The feature of the ordinance in which Salem has taken the initiative on this score is the compelling of saloons to have a man of clear vision with no obstruction in the way, 10 feet long by three feet wide, five feet above the ground, in the front of each place of business. This will make anyone in the saloon visible from the street.

The ordinance, which received the entire approval of the council with the exception of one (who is a prohibitionist and refuses to vote for any license), contains the following restrictions in addition to those noted:

A bond must be placed in the hands of the city recorder for \$500, guaranteeing the saloon owner that the saloon shall be allowed within 500 feet of a school; no back rooms; no liquor to be sold in disreputable houses or dives; no liquor to be sold to minors, drunkards or intoxicated persons.

Infraction of any of the provisions subjects the offender to a fine of from \$10 to \$100, or imprisonment from 5 to 30 days. Any minor representing himself to be of age is subject to the same penalty.

This ordinance was drafted by Mayor Rodgers, so that, now that it has passed the council, there is no danger of a veto other than for a defect in the wording.

TIDE OF IDLE MEN TURNS TO THE NORTH

Grants Pass, Or., April 9.—Freight trains from the south are carrying from 50 to 100 men on the hurricane deck of the freight cars. One hundred and fifty men were dropped off here from one train, the crew having been ordered to carry the men no farther than Grants Pass. Mayor Smith objected, however, to having so many men being thrust upon the city and ordered them on. Special police were called and the trainmen were forced to proceed with their load. Every train is being watched and gangs of men that crowd the cars are compelled to move on as they way to British Columbia and Alaska. Some of them are professional hoboes, but many are workmen out of employment. So large are the gangs that the train crews are not able to fight them off and are obliged to transport them. It is stated that over 1,000 idle men are now on their way north from Nevada and southern California, and that these will be pouring into Portland, Seattle and other northern cities within the next few weeks. Very few of them drop off in southern Oregon as there is not much demand for labor here outside of farm or sawmill work at this time.

VERDICT IS AGAINST RAILROAD COMPANY

The Southern Pacific must pay damages of \$4,850 to Richard Shields, according to a verdict returned in Judge O'Day's department of the circuit court yesterday afternoon. The jury was out about four hours before it agreed.

Shields asked for \$20,000 damages for personal injuries sustained when he was struck by a train at the foot of the steps leading to the upper deck of the steel bridge from Front street. His right arm was disabled and he was otherwise severely injured. He is a barber by trade.

The jury came into court during the afternoon to ask Judge O'Day whether or not the railroad had a right to maintain the stairway to the bridge without providing some warning signal. The court would not answer this question directly, saying he could not pass on a question of fact, but gave the general instruction that the railroad is required to care for the public safety along its tracks.
