

# PEOPLE'S RULE WILL DOMINATE LEGISLATURE

Throughout the state great interest is being manifested in the candidates for the legislature who are pledged to Statement No. 1. After a careful analysis of the situation it has been concluded that the next legislature will have a Statement No. 1 majority of at least nine votes in joint assembly. This estimate was based on a conservative calculation after taking into consideration the sentiment of the different districts, the number of candidates running for each office and other pertinent considerations. It is possible that the margin may be still greater when the ballots are counted and the returns made following the June election.

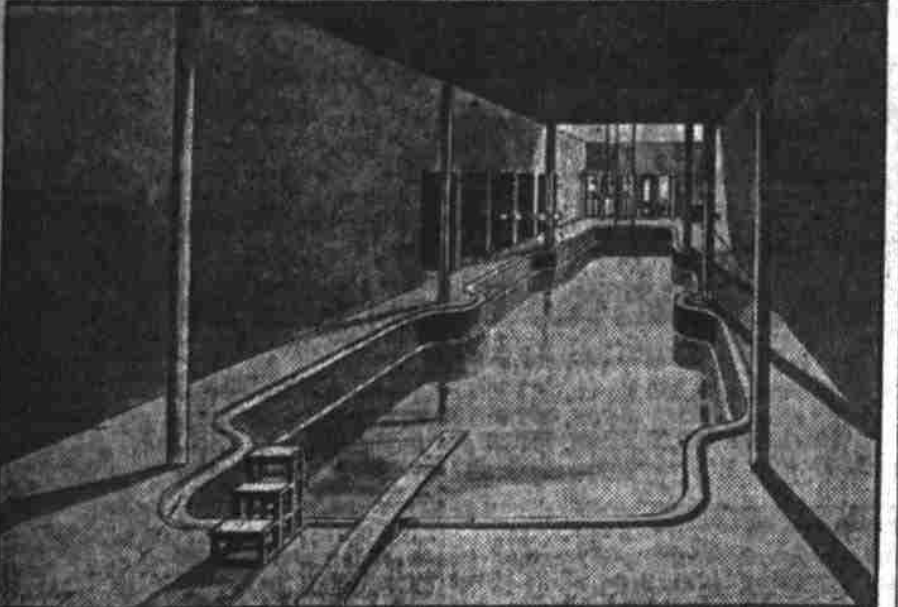
## HAND OF LAW FALLS HEAVILY

One after another presiding Judge Cleland heard their stories. One, who pleaded guilty to simple larceny, received one year in jail, but all the others will go to the penitentiary.

R. H. Baugh and Victor Hollender, who stole trousers and suitcases out of a Southern Pacific car, were each sentenced to serve 18 months in the penitentiary. Richard Baugh, father of the other man of the same name, who sold a portion of the goods, must serve two years. The Baughs said Hollender led them into the affair, and Hollender said the Baughs started him on the wrong road.

C. L. Tankley was sentenced to serve 18 months for embezzling money from Paul Strain, by whom he was employed. He tried the old game of running to police headquarters with his clothing ripped
