

WILL CUT BASIN IN RIVER AT ONCE

Portland & Seattle Railway Company Applies for Use of Dredger.

PORT OF PORTLAND HOLDS MEETING

General Disposition of Property Owners in Lower Harbor to Secure Deeper Water Along Docks to Keep Pace With Shipping.

Dredging was the main topic of discussion at the meeting of the Port of Portland commission yesterday afternoon. Several applications from owners of property along the west shore of the harbor north of the landing of the lower ferry requested dredging for deeper water in order to accommodate the rapidly increasing shipping and the Portland & Seattle railway came in for a request for at least one of the dredges for the digging of a basin between the foot of Swan Island and the bridge across the Willamette.

Instead of leasing the dredge to the railroad company by the day it was decided to enter into contract to have the port do the work at a stipulated sum per yard in which even the work will be superintended by Consulting Engineer J. C. B. Lockwood and the gravel from the river bottom used for filling the railroad company's low-lying property on the west bank where the bridge crosses the river.

The franchise for the bridge calls for this basin and the digging will therefore conform with its provisions. It was deemed necessary to have the channel widened at that point to at least 600 feet so that in case the draw for some reason or other should fail to open it would be possible to drop anchor and stop an approaching vessel without danger of accident. There was a slight difference of opinion as to where the basin was to be located, to the east or west of the regular channel but the matter was settled by agreeing to have it made wide enough to accommodate the largest vessels entering the harbor under any and all circumstances. Possibly the basin will eventually be made 750 feet wide by about 1,500 long above the bridge and tapering from that width to the regular 300-foot channel below it.

The matter of dredging channels from the main channel to the various mill properties along the west shore in the harbor was referred to a committee composed of Captain Pease, Consulting Engineer Lockwood and Superintendent Groves, who has charge of the dredges.

TO LOAD FOR MOLLENDO.

Schooner W. R. Hume Coming to Columbia River Mill.

The American schooner W. R. Hume is reported under charter to come to one of the Columbia river mills to load lumber for Molledo, Peru. She will carry away about 1,000,000 feet.

The Hume was nearly lost about six months ago when on Puget sound Caught in a terrible gale she drove on the rocks but managed to hold together and tug successfully getting home when the storm subsided. She was here several years ago and took lumber for the island of Molledo.

Half dozen large American lumber droghers are booked to arrive on the Columbia in the near future, among them being the Minero, from Newcastle, New South Wales, with a cargo of coal, the Chehalis in ballast from the Hawaiian Islands, the Echo from Callao, Peru, and the Churchill from Keelung, Formosa.

RAN TOO CLOSE TO SHORE.

Captain Swanson of the Pomona Loses License for Six Months.

(United Press Special Wire.) San Francisco, April 10.—For six months Captain Charles Swanson will be without a license as a skipper because he stranded the steamer Pomona, of which he was commander, on rocks off Port Ross on March 17.

This punishment was imposed by the United States local board of steamboat inspectors after a thorough investigation and after Captain Swanson frankly admitted that he alone was responsible for the shipwreck. Inspectors of hulls and boilers, O. F. Boiles and John K. Bulger, in reporting the results of their investigation said that Swanson had been unskillful in navigating his vessel so close to the shore, and in deviating from the usual course.

2,000 CHILDREN TO BE IN PARADE

East Side Pupils Will Take Part in Fiesta Celebration.

East side children will parade on the east side during the Rose Carnival. At a special meeting of the East Side Business Men's club held yesterday afternoon the details of the plan were arranged by which a parade of east side children will be the feature of the grand mask carnival to be held on the east side on Thursday evening of the carnival week. This parade is regarded by the east side business men as one of the most attractive features of the week's festivities. Invitation has been extended to 2,000 children. The enrollment of these children will begin at once at the East Side Athletic club, East Morrison street and Grand avenue. M. M. Ringler, director of the club, has been secured by the east side business men to direct the training of the children and Mr. Ringler has already issued his invitation through the press. The enrollment must be completed by Monday evening, April 20, and children wishing to take part will call at Mr. Ringler's office between 4 o'clock and 6 o'clock each evening until that date. Children who took part in the parade last year will be given the preference over those who have not gone through that experience. However, other children will be admitted to the parade. Children in all parts of the city are anxious to take part in the Rose Festival and it is not feared that that enough children will be found in a short time to fill out the desired number required. Only east side children between the ages of 10 and 15 years will be accepted. The line of march will be over the principal central east side thoroughfares only and will not exceed one mile in length. The parade will furthermore, be in the evening when there will be no heat. So, it is thought, the objections have been eliminated. According to the plans outlined by the festival management one evening has been set aside for the parade. The east side thoroughfares will be especially illuminated and decorated for the occasion and all the music and other movable features of the carnival will be transferred to the east side for that occasion. It is the plan to hold a grand parade at that time, in which the partakers will be masked and confetti throwing will be the chief amusement. There will be plenty of music, at least two bands. It is for this feature of the big show that the parade of east side children is being arranged. The drills will occur in the evening and will not be monotonous. The work will be of value to the children and will assist the business men in decorating the east side thoroughfares.
