ONLY ROSS CASE IN PRESENT TERM

With Possibility That Even That May Also Be Crowded Over.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., April 10.—J. Thorburn Ross alone of the three indicted Portland Title Guarantee & Trust company officials will be tried during the present term of the criminal department of the circuit court of this district, judging from the present crowded condition of the court calendar. The dates set for the hearing of cases in the circuit court before Judge Burnett have already slipped one day behind, and the prospects are that matters will become even worse than this, owing to the number of cases to be tried. In spite of the efforts of District Attorney McNary of this district, and of District Attorney Manning of Portland, to have the cases set at an early date, Judge Burnett was able to set a time only for the hearing of Ross on April 20, the only date at which there was a gap on his calendar. The cases of John E. Atchison and T. P. Burkhart will be crowded out until the July term, unless the unexpected occurs or Judge Burnett sets aside the hearing of some other case in favor of these two. District Attorney McNary, who represents Manning, and Attorney William E. Kaiser, representing Ross, who will draw the jury in the hearing of the Ross case, do not expect to exhaust the list of 50 jurors summoned for the April

MARINE HANGED FOR MURDER OF COMRADE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Norfolk, Va., April 10.—Leo C. Thurman was hanged here this morning for the murder of Walter P. Dolson, in a boarding house in Norfolk on February 1, 1906. Thurman escaped directly after he committed the murder, and was captured in Vancouver, British Columbia. He entered a plea of insanity. After he had been convicted and sentenced to hang the supreme court postponed the hanging to allow Thurman time to introduce testimony showing that he was insane. He failed to give convincing proof of this, and the hanging was allowed to proceed. Thurman and Dolson were United States marines.

Centralia Masons Will Build. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Centralia, Wash., April 10.—Members of the Masonic fraternity of this city have taken the preliminary steps to construct at some point on Tower avenue a large three-story building to be used as a Masonic Temple.

COLLEGE CATHOLIC SOCIETIES' SESSION

(United Press Leased Wire.) Lafayette, Ind., April 10.—The organization of a national league of the Catholic societies of American universities will be the result of a convention opened today at Purdue university. Representatives from institutions from all parts of the country, including Harvard and other big universities are already in the city to attend the session. In view of the fact that all big colleges have local societies of Catholic students, it is figured that by organizing on a national scale the work of this nature will be easier by centralizing it. It is pointed out by those who are advocating this new organization that one great advantage of it will be the interchange of ideas on the methods in use in the various institutions.

CAKE TALKS ON STATEMENT ONE

Republicans at La Grande Hear Candidate for United States Senator.
