

MORE TARS FOR FLEET

Naval Department Orders 700 Men to Asiatic Station to Fill Complements of Ships to Full Quota—Sightseeing Program.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, April 11.—The naval department today issued orders to dispatch 700 enlisted men from New York to the Asiatic station for the purpose of filling the complements of the ships up to the full quota.

The Pacific, now en route from Guantanamo to New York, has been detailed to take aboard these sailors at Colon May 14. They will be transported across the isthmus to Panama City and go aboard the supply ship Buffalo, which will deliver them at San Francisco by June 1. Thence the sailors will be transported to Manila.

San Francisco, April 11.—Judging from the official program of the sightseeing committee that San Francisco just issued, a really good time is in store for the officers and men of the Atlantic fleet. The arrangements will afford them a rare opportunity to observe the program that San Francisco has made in the building line and to see the wonderful scenery adjacent to the city. The official program follows:

Monday, May 1.—Automobile run through the city for Secretary Metcalf, distinguished visitors and officers of the fleet. Observation car rides for 1,000 enlisted men, starting from the Ferry building at 8:30 a. m., 11 a. m., 1:30 p. m. and 4 p. m.

Tuesday, May 2.—Excursion to Valjeo for 600 officers and men of the fleet.

Wednesday, May 3.—Trip to Mount

Tamalpais and Mulwood, with lunch at Mount Tamalpais for 200 officers of the fleet. Car rides for 1,000 enlisted men on Monday. Trip to San Jose for 500 officers of the fleet, with a grand dinner in the evening.

FINED FOR FAILURE TO SERVE WARRANT

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., April 11.—A. G. McMillan, city marshal of Silverton, was yesterday found guilty by a jury and sentenced by Judge Burnett in the circuit court to pay a fine of \$50 or spend 25 days in the county jail, for failure to serve a warrant issued by the police judge for the arrest of C. N. Matlock on a charge of opening his saloon in violation of law. McMillan chose to pay the fine.

Matlock was found guilty on the first ballot by the same jury that tried McMillan, during an interim in the latter's trial, and was also fined \$50. McMillan set up as his defense that he did not arrest the saloonkeeper on instructions from the city council not to do so. He also stated that he was about to serve the warrant when told not to by Mayor Julius Wolfe. The attention of the jury was directed to the fact that McMillan was elected, and not appointed by the council, and therefore did not have to obey the council's orders.

District Attorney McNary prosecuted the case for the state and Attorney George G. Bingham appeared for the defendant.

TO CARRY ALBANY'S FAME OVER SEAS

Advertising Contract Calls for the Translation of Boost Staff and Printing in Journals in Europe.

Albany, Or., April 11.—The Albany Commercial club has entered into a contract with a well-known coast magazine for a year's advertising at the contract price of \$2,500. In connection with the large advertisement to be carried in the magazine, the company agrees to have matter descriptive of Albany and Linn county translated into foreign languages and printed in leading papers of the old world. This magazine alone has a circulation of 125,000 monthly, and its readers are to be found in every section of the United States.

NEW DAILY FOR TACOMA READERS TO RAISE SHEEP

Founder of the Ledger Intends Publishing Afternoon Paper on May 15.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tacoma, April 11.—Announcement of the publication of a new newspaper for Tacoma was made yesterday afternoon in a circular letter sent out by R. P. Radebaugh and F. H. Eastman. The first number is to appear "about the 15th of May," the statement says, "and will begin with 12, 14 or 16 pages." "Shortly thereafter," a Sunday edition is promised. The paper will be named the Tacoma Daily Tribune. The United Press is depended upon for a telegraph report, with a service from special correspondents. Mr. Radebaugh said this morning: "The paper will be non-partisan in politics, will allow no personal attacks in its columns and will never wield the lash. It will print the news fully and fairly. The success of the Tribune will demonstrate that there is a big field for another newspaper in Tacoma." "The Tribune will be an evening paper. Offices have already been secured in the Bankers' Trust building. Slips by the thousand have been sent out for signatures binding those signing to pay a year's subscription for the paper within one month after the first issue." Radebaugh was the founder of the Tacoma Ledger, and the pioneer newspaper of Tacoma. He recently bought the outfit of a Seattle afternoon paper, which will be utilized. Eastman is recently here from Boston, where he has had much experience in newspaper work.

WASCO RANCHER SHOOT HIS FOE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., April 11.—H. H. Smith, a rancher living several miles southward from the river, and reports that he has shot a powerful built man, had come to town and was returning home in his wagon when he met Stringer, a small man. They had some words, and Stringer, thinking Smith was going to beat him, drew his gun and fired. He then ran into the woods. Smith mounted a horse and rode into town. His wound proved to be only a slight flesh wound in the breast. Stringer came into town and "ave himself up."

RAILROAD INQUIRY IN SOUTH ENDED

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, April 11.—The inquiry conducted by the state railroad commission into alleged discrimination in freight rates by California railroads, which has been in progress here several days, was concluded yesterday.

Attorney-General Webb, in adjourning the inquiry, stated that it would be resumed in San Francisco on a date to be determined hereafter.

One result of the investigation was to show that the Santa Fe railroad had discriminated against San Francisco wholesalers, in favor of Los Angeles jobbers, in a contest for San Diego trade.

The inquiry is generally regarded as a farce by those who have followed the proceedings, as practically no evidence was introduced for the prosecution.

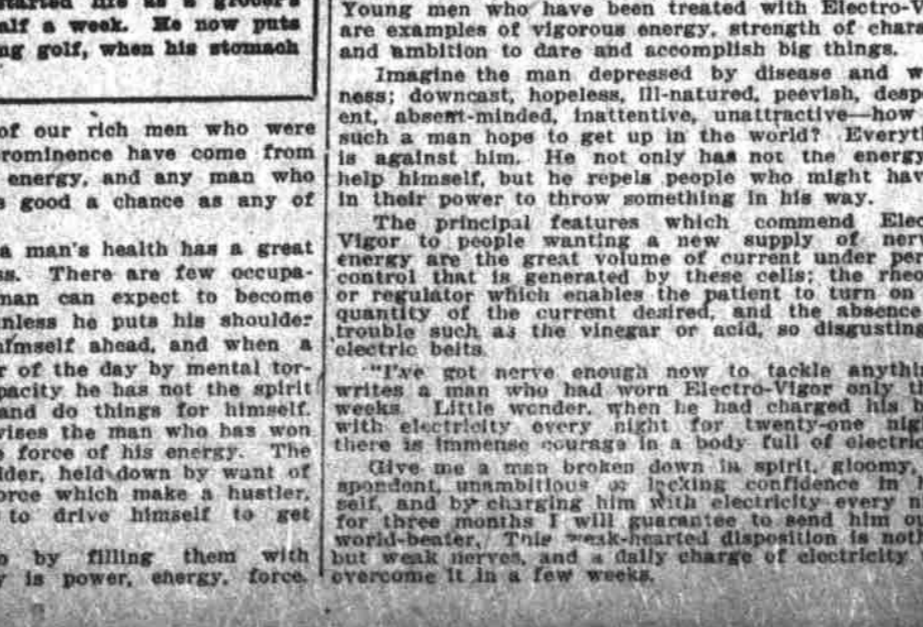

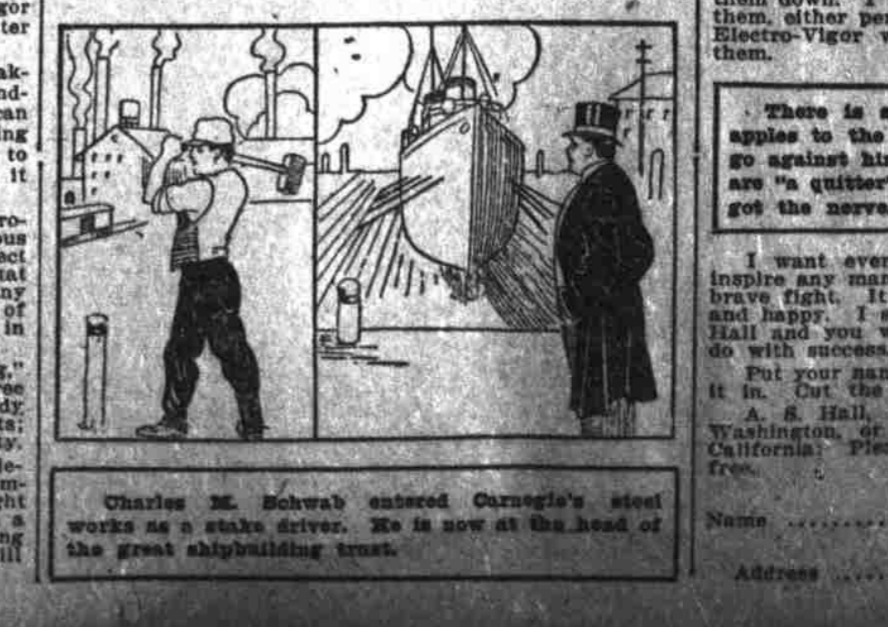
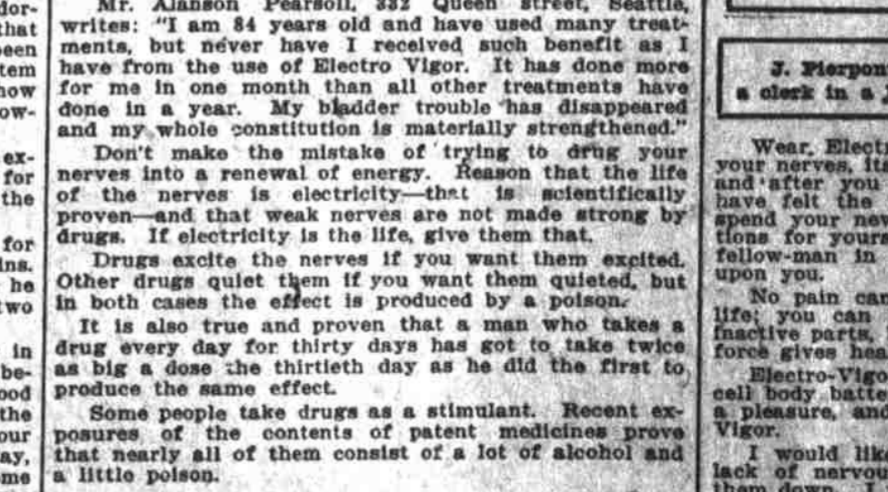
