

HUGHES IS CHOICE, BUT-

Receives New York Delegation's Indorsement with a Long String to It—Several Wavering Districts Wobble Into Line.

New York, April 11.—The Republican state convention today held to select delegates at large to the Republican national convention indorsed Governor Charles E. Hughes for president. The indorsement was not one that brought joy, however, to the hearts of the friends of the governor. It was a sort of a favorite son, take-the-car-ahead endorsement that is not calculated to bring to the support of the governor any wavering districts in the state, or unearthy hosts in other states. It was not quite as virile as the brand of soft soap passed for the benefit of Levi P. Morton in 1896 when he was governor, and lacked in the ringing quality of the golden enthusiasm that marked the selection of Chauncey Mitchell Depew as the favorite son when the Vanderbilts thought he would make a better man in the White House than in the New York Central offices. Still, it was an indorsement and was defended by such loyal Hughes men as Timothy L. Woodruff, Seneca Payne and others. The opposition to the character of the indorsement came when the committee reported in the afternoon session.

Reads Platform.

Senator Horace White, the chairman, read the platform. It was filled with the platitudes that have marked the majority of the platforms and the blarney of expediency. Then came the last paragraph and the battle by the friends of the governor.

This paragraph, after a skimmed milk indorsement of the administration of Governor Hughes, closed with the following near instructions: "And urging all the delegates that they present the name of Governor Hughes to the national Republican convention and that they use every honorable means to bring about his nomination for president."

Senator Edward Brackett of Saratoga was on his feet in a minute and was recognized by the chairman, James S. Sherman. Senator Brackett had a substitute for the last paragraph. The substitute appeared to have some red blood in it. It read: "The Republicans of the state very earnestly favor the nomination of Governor Hughes for the presidency in the coming convention; they will not be satisfied with a support by the delegates that is perfunctory or spiritless. In view of this sentiment and of recent events the delegates at large selected by this convention are instructed and delegates from the several districts are requested to persistently labor for his nomination until the nomination is made."

There was some applause when Brackett read his substitute, which was in the form of a motion, but was in reality a minority report. Chairman Woodruff, whose boom has been reported as bursting with Hughes sentiment, was on his feet in a minute. There was too much meat in the substitute to please Mr. Woodruff. He said the minority report was signed by only seven of the 57 men on the committee on resolutions.

To adopt the minority report, in his opinion, would be a serious reflection upon the majority of the committee and also on the men who were to be sent as delegates.

Seneca E. Payne defended the reflection on the majority. Assemblyman Merritt came to the aid of Brackett, but it was useless. The "ham stringing" resolution was put through with a handful of the governor's friends voting no. The convention named General Stewart L. Woodford of New York, former Mayor of New York, Frederick H. Hazzard of Syracuse and Edward H. Butler of Buffalo as delegates at large to the national Republican convention. All of the delegates at large are known to be friends of Hughes, but the ticket is not the strongest Hughes aggregation that could have been named.

TEN THOUSAND MEN HOMELESS

Chicago Laborers Are Begging Lodgings or Seeking Hallway Shelter.

Chicago, April 11.—Ten thousand stranded workmen are nightly begging lodgings or seeking shelter in the hallways of public buildings and under the structure of elevated roads, in the parks and elsewhere in Chicago. A police census of the homeless and stranded men and boys was completed tonight by officers for a report to the mayor. The census has been taken since the early part of the week, when 400 Bulgarian laborers walked into the city hall and county buildings at both places asked the authorities for food, shelter, work or transportation to some point where they might get work.

SALOON PORTER IS ROBBED BY BANDITS

Chicago, April 11.—In full view of a crowd of terrified pedestrians, three young desperadoes today held up and robbed Hattie Pope, a saloon porter employed by Frank Pope, No. 2322 State street. The robbers held a revolver to Pope's head and rifled his pockets of \$1,250 he had drawn from the bank to use by his employer in cashing the checks of workmen. With their pistols the thugs intimidated the crowd and made their escape.

RUEF SPRINGS HIS OLD YARN

Grafter Reiterates Flimsy Story of Prejudice; Is an "Innocent" Man.

SAVES CHILD BY KILLING IT

Insane Insurance Man Attempts to Take Three Lives.

Buffalo, N. Y., April 11.—To save his wife and child from the disgrace which would result from the exposure of his peculations as assistant cashier of the Mutual Life Insurance company, Lionel M. Cole, 31 years old, had planned to murder his wife, whom he believed was imbued with supernatural powers, his baby, whom he regarded as supernatural, and then to kill himself. This was the substance of testimony taken by the jury commission which reported to Justice Wheeler today. Cole was then committed to the state hospital for criminal insane at Mattawa.

NOT SATISFIED WITH DAUGHTER'S STORY

Maybe Mrs. Thomason Struck Stove in Falling; Maybe She Was Knocked Down by Chair.

Walla Walla, Wash., April 11.—Coroner Mackrath decided late this afternoon to call a coroner's jury Monday morning to inquire into the death of Mrs. Matthew Thomason, who died early this morning under suspicious circumstances. Neighbors say Thomason drank Wednesday night and during a quarrel with his wife hit her over the head with a chair. Physicians when called to the unconscious and she remained in that condition until her death today. An autopsy held this morning by Drs. Braden and Russell revealed concussion of the brain. Thomason's daughter exonerates her father from all blame. She says her father came home drunk Wednesday night and attacked her. She grabbed a butcher knife and struck him in the face, making a slight wound. The mother and daughter were dressing the wound when the mother fainted and in falling struck her head on a stove, rendering her unconscious. Thomason is reputed to be a hard drinker.

TWELVE VOTERS DIE AT POLLS

Despite Censorship News of Murders at Portugal Election Leaks Out.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
London, April 11.—Delayed messages arriving from Lisbon, Portugal, show that the recent elections, in which the government won a victory, were far from being as peaceable as related in censored dispatches. In reality the elections were conducted under strictest monarchical surveillance, troops on guard everywhere to prevent outbreaks, details of soldiers with quick-firing guns stationed in the streets to overawe the people. Whole districts where outbreaks were deemed likely to occur were shut off from the public, no one being permitted to enter or leave without military passes. Even despite these precautions, the elections did not pass without serious disorder and bloodshed. At least 12 persons were killed in fighting and 90 were injured, several fatally. More than 600 arrests were made.

The facts are just becoming public because no messages truthfully reporting the situation were permitted to go out. It was necessary to use the mails to get the facts out of Portugal. At every voting place frequent disorders occurred, notwithstanding all efforts to prevent it. Rioting was put down with an
