

# NORTH ALBINA HIGH SCHOOL

### Building to Cost a Quarter-Million Dollars Will Soon Be Constructed.

Members of the board of education yesterday decided to erect the new \$250,000 high school building recently authorized by the taxpayers of the school district, on the block bounded by Emerson, Webster, Congress and Kirby streets. The board also ordered advertisements for plans and specifications which are to be handed in by June 25. Work will be pushed on the building as rapidly as possible.

Efforts will be made by the board to secure the vacation of Congress street in front of the new structure, and property owners and the councilmen will be requested to favor the project in order to give the site as great a frontage as possible.

Efforts will be made to have the new structure finished by the time the 1909 session commences, although it is doubtful if this can be accomplished because of the great size of the building. Superintendent Rigler stated that the structure will be filled as soon as it can be finished because of the great population growing up in that section of the city. J. H. Nolta was appointed by the board to enlist the aid of property owners to secure the vacation of the property owners.

The board also authorized Architect Jones to draw plans and specifications for an eight-room school building in Albina. The board will act upon the resolution of the Men's Methodist club of the Woodlawn church in reference to the alterations and additions to the school at Woodlawn at the next meeting of the board.

## AMENDMENTS TO UNITED FRANCHISE

### Councilmen Want Airbrakes Throughout and a Regular Service.

As predicted in Sunday's Journal, the city council did not pass the United Railways company's franchise yesterday afternoon, but added several amendments which will necessitate the re-consideration of the ordinance before it can be finally adopted.

Among the amendments was one by Councilman Annand to make the measure specifically state that the company was to sprinkle the streets free of charge. Another requires the company to place airbrake equipment on freight cars as well as passenger cars, while a third amendment provides that the company shall run not less than one passenger car an hour between the hours of 8 a. m. and 2 p. m. between Portland and Mount Calvary, and between 6 a. m. and 10 p. m. between Portland and Hillsboro.

Councilman Concannon introduced an amendment regulating the fare between Mount Calvary and Portland not to exceed 10 cents. Another amendment provides that the company shall not install rails on any part of its lines weighing less than 70 pounds. The original section provided for rails not less than 60 pounds.

## FRED A. KRIBS IS SUED FOR HEAVY DAMAGES

J. O. Storey has begun suit in the circuit court against Fred A. Kribs for \$65,027 damages on a timber land deal. He says that in September, 1906, he agreed to buy 7,480 acres from the defendant if he found it satisfactory after cruising. He was to pay \$25 per acre, the first payment of \$50 to be made on January 1, 1907. He says that by December 15, 1906, he finished the work of cruising and accepted the land, but that Kribs refused to execute the deed to perfect his title. The following June he grew tired of waiting, it appears, and he sued Kribs for the amount of the contract. He asks for \$2,077 to reimburse him for his expenses, and \$63,000 damages for profits he failed to make.

## YOUNG WOULD BE R. R. COMMISSIONER

Ogleby Young, one of the well known Democratic agitators of Portland, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for railroad commissioner. Although Mr. Young has become a candidate late to have his name appear upon the ballot he is expected his friends to give him the nomination by writing the name in on the ballot and in this manner giving him the nomination. Following the primaries Mr. Young, if he is given the nomination, will become an active candidate, making the race against the Republican candidate for the office from this district.
