They will slow down to 7 or even 6 knots, it is found that they are in danger of coming in ahead of schedule.

Fleet Sighted.
When the Connecticut, mere speck on the horizon, was sighted, with the other ships of the fleet close behind, a mighty cheer went up. Flagg, hats and handkerchiefs were waved and the demonstration continued long after the last ship had dropped anchor.

The first news of the fleet reached the waiting throng soon after 11 o'clock. Flagg then announced that the ships had been sighted about 30 miles down the coast and were moving toward the bay at the scheduled hour—1 o'clock. The word was quickly passed all around the bay and the air of excitement was more tense, but the crowds were good natured and tried to be patient despite the fact that they knew the two hours' wait would be long. The minutes seemed like hours and many who had brought their lunches forgot their appetites. Others sat on wraps and gazed at the sea, talking and laughing and trying to kill time.

At noon the ships were reported off the Coronado islands, black granite sentinels that stick their grim heads out of the Pacific just below the immediate waters. From Point Loma the 14 battleships, steaming in perfect formation, could easily be picked out. They were making good time, the 14 lines of black smoke stretching far behind them. As they approached they flashed red and white signals and the bay from the Connecticut to steam on a slow bell. With the precision of a well-oiled machine, the fleet moved on, the Rear Admiral Thomas acting commander-in-chief, flying from the peak, turned into the channel.

Respects to Thomas.

The ships hardly had come to anchor when a committee headed by Director General Clayton, Mayor Forward and other prominent citizens of San Diego boarded a launch, steamed swiftly out to the flagship to pay their respects to Rear Admiral Thomas. Meanwhile scores of other craft, loaded to the gunwales with sightseers and relatives of the men on board the battleships hovered around the fighters. Little in the way of reception was possible this afternoon, owing to the presence of the hour and to the fact that the officers and men of the fleet were busy in making everything shipshape for the reception of the many sailors who will throng the decks in the next three days.

HOW SAN DIEGO PREPARED TO RECEIVE FLEET

San Diego, April 14.—In the decisions citizens have augmented the work of the fleet celebration committee, and the results are pleasing. The three prominent business streets, D between the waterfront and Seventh, and Fifth and Sixth, between the bay shore and A, together with intersecting streets, have been made beautiful by the display of thousands of flags of various colors, blended with large streamers of gold, typical of California.

Every place of business along these streets, with their greater respect to the residences of the city, have been profusely decorated. Four great arches of the mission style of architecture were erected, one on each of the streets D, Fifth and B, Fifth and H, and Juniper and Fifth streets, studded with flags and equipped with electric lighting. On the more prominent blocks in the business section, including the court-house, city hall, Grant hotel, Granger block and the Scripps building, the fixtures are in place for thousands of incandescent lights, and the buildings are gorgeously decorated.

The battleships anchor outside the harbor, a short distance off Hotel del Coronado, which will be the headquarters of the officers.

Fleet of Sailboats.

A fleet of sailboats, flying the colors of the San Diego Yacht club, met the ships at the anchorage grounds. William Clayton, director general of the fleet celebration, and the chairman of the various reception committees, will be received on board the flagship Connecticut.

At 6 o'clock a dinner in honor of the commander-in-chief and 50 of the officers of the fleet will be given at the Hotel del Coronado. During the evening signal fires will be burned along the Coronado and San Diego waterfront, and the warships will be illuminated. Wednesday morning 16 launches, bearing 160 of the prettiest girls of San Diego, will meet the fleet. The girls will be divided into bands of the young women gifts of flowers and fruit, and in the form of lemonade, 2,000 gallons of which will be consumed, or the water from 150 boxes. The beverage has been placed in bottles, and is in cold storage, ready for delivery.

The afternoon 5,000 men will be landed on the San Diego waterfront, under command of Captain Sexton Brown, U. S. N. The landing party will be formed at the point where the landing is made, the showing made by the officers and men of the fleet will be augmented by the civic and military
