

# ONE TICKET IS PLEDGED

Republican Legislative Candidates Who Have Sworn to Support Statement No. 1 Are Asking the Votes of Citizens of Multnomah.

Republican voters in Multnomah county who believe in the principle of direct election of United States senators and the means of securing such action on the part of the legislature of the state, Statement No. 1, will have ample opportunity at the primaries to voice their sentiments at the polls, for there is a full ticket pledged to Statement No. 1. In all there are seven candidates for the senate and 15 for the house who have pledged themselves to Statement No. 1. There is one candidate on the Democratic ticket for state senator, Walter C. Farnham, who is pledged to Statement No. 1.

On the Republican ballot there is a full list of candidates pledged to Statement No. 1, the members of which list were induced to run by the petition of a large number of prominent and well known business and professional men of the city who are opposed to machine rule and the reversion of Multnomah county politics to the old system of boss rule and political corruption. In order to distinguish between the candidates those men who were persuaded to run by the petition and whose campaign slogan is "Principles not to scramble for office," their names are printed here in capital letters, together with their numbers upon the official ballot. The names of the other candidates are printed in ordinary type.

# JAPS WORRY ENGLISHMEN

People Look With Alarm Upon Attempts of Allies to Find Fight With Some Foreign Power — Australians Are Alarmed.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
London, April 15.—British officialdom is growing gravely uneasy over the increasing strain on the China-Japanese relations. The situation is the topic of much informal consideration, and reports are current that English diplomats in the orient have been instructed to exert every possible influence for peace.

For one thing, Downing street can't see how Britain stands to profit by a division of China between Japan and Russia. For another there is increasing uneasiness at the threat of Japanese expansion.

Englishmen are becoming convinced that the mikado is casting longing eyes toward India. Australia is unduly excited in a state of panic.

"You cannot keep a colony merely by flying a flag over it," declared Premier yesterday at the Australasian chamber of commerce in London. "If you are going to keep Australia, some one has got to stand up and fight for it."

Extensive acquisitions by Japan in the Pacific would naturally bridge Nippon's steps nearer to both India and Australia.

England is getting more and more nervous, too, lest the Anglo-Japanese alliance drag the occidental half of the partnership into some international complication in which Britain will have everything to lose and nothing whatever to gain.

The people, if not the government, are plainly beginning to think Japanese diplomacy has become altogether too aggressive and to wish heartily that the alliance had never been thought of.

Of course, China's anti-Japanese boycott is the latest subject of worry. It looks as if the Chinese were going to make good their threat of damaging Japanese commerce \$300,000,000 worth in retaliation for the humiliation of the Tatsu Maru incident. The boycott extends from bankers and noblemen to coolies. Women and children are enlisting in it. It promises soon to become of national scope.

Captain Woo King Ying, the Chinese officer who seized the Tatsu and was degraded by his government for doing it, is the most popular man in China. Japan is already insisting that the movement be suppressed. The Chinese government cannot suppress it. English sympathizers with it. Britons think the Japanese were all wrong in the Tatsu matter, and that China is justified in getting even.

Another threat of trouble is seen in the recent Japanese attack on the United States consulate at Mukden. Investigation proves that a Japanese postman with a letter for Consul-General Straight tried to enter by a private door, was repulsed by the consular servants, got several countrymen to help him, broke in, beat a number of the servants, and finally forced the consular to call on the Chinese police for help. The matter might have been easily settled but for Japanese Consul-General Kato's intimation that the dispute was trivial and his delay in investigation.

# CHARGES COLLINS WITH OVERCHARGE

James Sykes of Dallas in Controversy With Land Board Agent.

Salem, Or., April 15.—Complaint has been made against Judge J. L. Collins of Dallas, who alleges that Collins, who has for a number of years loaned state school funds in Polk county, overcharged him for an application for a loan. The charges were heard by Treasurer Steel and Governor Chamberlain of the land board yesterday afternoon. Their decision was reserved.

Sykes charged that Collins had been overcharging those who applied for loans of school money. Collins had been appointed by the board to act for it in Polk county and to receive applications for loans out of the state school fund. Sykes says Collins charged him \$15 for filing his application and \$10 for a worthless abstract, which if forwarded to the land board, would have defeated his application for a loan. Sykes said he had asked for a \$2,000 loan but never had obtained it because of this dispute with Judge Collins.

On the other hand, Collins said he had filed an application for Sykes without cost but he had made an abstract for him for \$10 and then charged him \$15 for examining it and giving an opinion on the abstract. Collins admitted that the abstract was worthless
