

SPRUCE UP FOR ROSE FESTIVAL

East Side Business Men Are Urged to Prepare for June Show.

At the meeting of the United East Side Push clubs last evening C. A. Bigelow, president of the East Side Business Men's club made a strong plea to the members of the united clubs to take an active part in the coming Rose Festival. He argued that the proposed parade of the school children would be one of the most attractive features, and he urged that the residents of the east side do all in their power to get the children out. The subject of decorations also was touched upon, and he asked the merchants and the citizens generally to make the east side as attractive as possible.

CLOSE UP SALOONS ON THE EAST SIDE

Purpose of Campaign Just Opened by Prohibition Workers.

East side pastors and laymen gathered last evening at Hawthorne Park Presbyterian church and decided to inaugurate a local option campaign, to be conducted on the east side only and to be confined within the city limits.

J. R. Knodell of the Anti-Saloon league of Oregon, called the meeting to order and Rev. E. Nelson Allen, pastor of the church, was chosen chairman, with Rev. A. J. Montgomery secretary. In his opening remarks Mr. Knodell stated that it was the desire to wipe out every saloon on the east side that nearly 700 young men had announced their desire to take up the work, and that one man alone had offered to raise \$1,000 to carry on the campaign.

CLEAN EAST SIDE BEFORE ROSE FESTIVAL

It is the desire of residents of the east side to have that portion of Portland thoroughly cleaned before the Rose Festival and to that end petitions are now being circulated. The Kenilworth improvement association has endorsed the movement by adopting resolutions to that effect, and a committee has been appointed to bring the subject to the attention of other push clubs of the east side.

ROSEBURG CAMP ADDS HUNDRED WOODMEN

Grand Logrolling in Which Head Officers and Visiting Camps Participate.

Roseburg, Or., April 15.—The big logrolling event of the Woodmen of the World was held in this city last night under the direction of the head officers of the order, consisting of I. L. Boak, head consul; T. Clinton Vesale, head adviser; P. E. Spodgrass, head banker; C. V. Benson, head clerk; M. R. Wilson, head escort; A. M. McKeller, head watchman, and other high officials, John Pittsley, R. P. Hawke and Dr. James Steinhilber, and over 300 visiting members from all over the state. The work consisted of the initiating of 100 candidates and was conducted by the head officers, assisted by the teams from Eugene, Cottage Grove and Roseburg. The convention was held at the Elks temple. A small banquet was the principal event of the evening. The credit for securing so large a number of candidates in this section is due to J. D. Henly, head escort, who has been in southern Oregon for the past month.

RICH GOLD STRIKE NEAR NEVADA CITY

Nevada City, Cal., April 15.—A remarkable strike of rich gold quartz is reported from Brownsville, 38 miles from Nevada City. The ore is said to assay from \$50,000 to \$100,000 per ton. Forty sacks taken out averaged \$1,000 to the sack. J. L. Lang and B. F. Beama, prospectors from Sulist, made the strike in an abandoned piece of ground. Other prospectors are rushing to Brownsville.
