**BIG STEAMERS TO LOAD LUMBER**

Two Fixed to Come Here During the Next Few Weeks.

**RIVER FORTH AND TABOR ENGAGED**

British Steamer Will Take Part Cargo on Puget Sound and Finish Here for Isthmus and Norwegian Craft Will Go to Australia.

Two large tramp steamers were chartered last night to carry lumber from this port. One is the Tabor flying the Norwegian colors, and the other the River Forth, which sails under the protection of the Union Jack.

The Tabor is at present on route from the Atlantic coast to San Francisco with a cargo of coal and will come north during the early part of June to load for Sydney. J. J. Moore & Co. will dispatch the cargo.

The River Forth is expected here during the latter part of this month. She is under charter to Jensen & Ostrander of Seattle and will load for Australia and Guaymas. Part of the cargo will be furnished on Puget sound. It will be finished here with approximately 1,000,000 feet.

The steamers are both large carriers, each having capacity for 3,500,000 feet.

**BRINGS BIG CROWD.**

Steamer Senator Has Record Passenger List.

The Harriman liner Senator, Captain Nopander, arrived at Astoria dock last night with the largest number of passengers ever brought here from San Francisco by the Harriman liners. There were 320 on board, 40 having disembarked at Astoria.

Captain Nopander reports having encountered strong headwinds all the way north and that detained her long en route. The Senator is expected to reach Astoria. It cost her 12 hours.

Arriving south the Senator will leave Astoria dock at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and thereby inaugurate the summer schedule. This arrangement gives the passengers a chance to view the Columbia river scenery. The Rose City leaves San Francisco for Portland the same day.

**LIGHT COAL MOVEMENT.**

Heavy Importations Last Fall Affect Season's Shipments.

Comparatively little coal will be imported here from Australia next fall, according to persons well acquainted with the fuel situation. Domestic mines are said to be increasing their output to such an extent that the mines in the antipodes will not come in for much of a demand from here. There is also a large amount of coal held over from last winter.

Cook Bay coal has been brought into Portland all winter in steadily increasing quantities and the same can be said of coal from the inland mines, especially in Washington. It is being reshipped to other ports in general satisfaction for all purposes.

**ASTORIA MARINE NEWS.**

**Ship Henry Villard is Ready to Proceed to Bristol Bay.**

(Special Dispatch to the Journal.)

Astoria, Or., April 15.—The American ship Henry Villard cleared at the custom house today for Nushagak river, Alaska, with a cargo of supplies for the Alaska Fishermen Packing company's cannery. She will probably sail tomorrow.

A bill of sale was filed in the custom house this morning whereby Alexander Miller sells the gasoline launch Meta M. to Mathias Matson and Michael Peterson for a consideration of \$15,000. The boat is six tons register and will be used as a passenger and freight boat on Tillamook bay.

**ALONG THE WATERFRONT.**

The oriental liner Arabia will be at Montgomery dock No. 3 late this evening. She reached Astoria at 2 o'clock this morning and left up at 11.

The steamer Eureka will not arrive here until the latter part of the week.

She was expected here yesterday but a dispatch from Coos says that it was decided to send her back to Eureka without coming here this time, in order to get back on her schedule, which calls for sailings from this port on Tuesday.

The grainhandlers are still out on strike and business manager, James Foley, says they will not return to work unless paid 35 cents an hour straight time and time and a half, or 52 1/2 cents, for over time. The exporters have offered them 25 cents and 50 cents. Half a dozen vessels are prevented from loading wheat as a result of the trouble.

With 17 inches of water in her hold the steam schooner Aurelia, Captain Weber, reached San Francisco today from Portland. The pumps had been kept going constantly and yet the vessel was taking water at the rate of nine inches an hour. When about to leave Astoria three days ago, the Aurelia was rammed by the steam schooner St. Helens also bound for the Bay City, and badly damaged. Instead of discharging the lumber cargo and repairing here, Captain Weber decided to return to San Francisco with the pumps keeping her afloat. The St. Helens stood by.

**IRRIGATION CONGRESS INVITES GOVERNOR**

Salem, Or., April 15.—Governor Chamberlain has received an invitation to attend the Sixtieth National Irrigation congress, to be held at Albuquerque, N. M., beginning September 29 and continuing to October 3. The invitation was received from Chairman W. S. Hopwell of the board of control.

In connection with the irrigation congress will also be held the Interstate industrial exposition. The governor was instructed to be ready to name delegates from Oregon to the irrigation congress by the time the official call is issued by the board of control.

**Army Ban on Cigarettes.**

(United Press London Wire.)

London, April 15.—With the object of discouraging cigarette smoking, General Lord Grenfell, commander-in-chief of the forces in Ireland, has issued an order to permit pipes only to be smoked on such occasions as when the men are resting after field operations and maneuvers. His order contains the following remarkable comment: "The commander of the forces has, during recent visits to military hospitals, been struck with the harm that the increasing prevalence of cigarette smoking is doing to the health of the army. It is not confined to the army and parliament is likely soon to deal with it as affecting the national health."

**Chehalis County Convention.**

Aberdeen, Wash., April 15.—The Republican county convention will be held here May 5 with 195 delegates. Preliminary will be held in the various precincts of the county May 2 to elect delegates to this convention, and it will be left to the committee to decide whether this shall be done on primary or caucus basis.
