Two suits filed by the United States against Monte Hutchinson and Sade E. Hutchinson, claiming fraud in timber entries, were dismissed in the federal court this morning. The government brought suit to cancel the patents. The Day Lumber company purchased the claims before the suits were filed and later intervened, claiming to have purchased the land in good faith. The government representatives investigated, with the result that the cases were ordered dismissed.

General Freight Agent Miller of the O. R. & N. company will run another crop demonstration train for the education of the eastern Washington farmers. The train will leave Pullman, Washington, at 9 o'clock a. m. May 5, and will stop at Pomeroy, Day, Dayton, Hartsfield, Walsburg, Prescott, Walla, Walla, Touchet and other points, the trip continuing two days. The train will be accompanied by the Pullman agricultural college will accompany the train to give lectures on crop diversification.

Because her funds were invested by Joseph E. Cronan in the Queen City insurance company, which went into involuntary liquidation, Mrs. Mary Conway was awarded a verdict for \$577.79 by a jury in Judge Gantenbein's department of the circuit court yesterday afternoon. 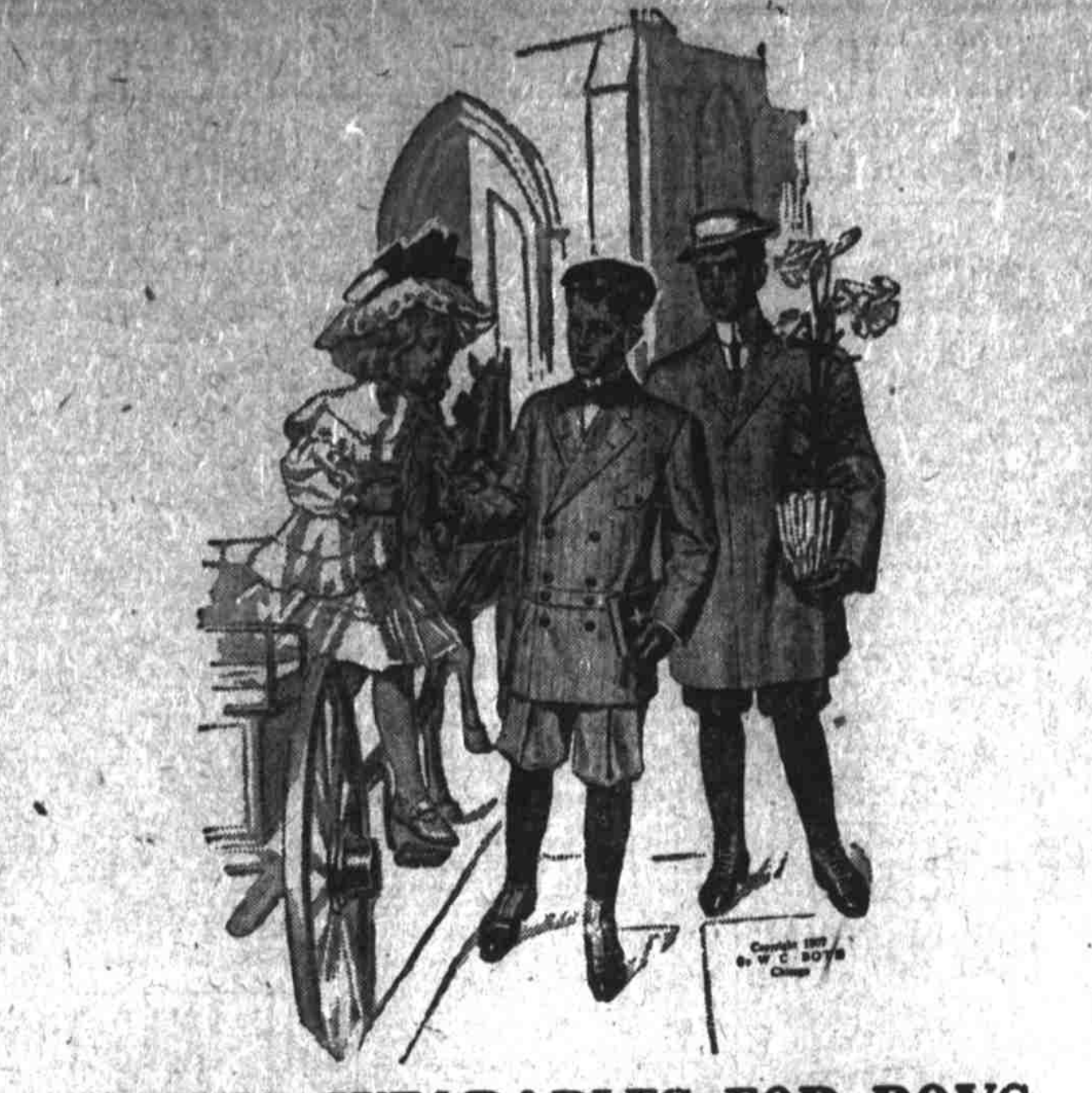

THE PLAY

Lyric—"La Belle Marie." "La Belle Marie" is a bill familiar to all confirmed followers of melodrama, and as a play it needs no introduction to patrons of the Lyric, who are being afforded the opportunity of viewing its revival by the Allen stock company this week. It has stood the test of the years remarkably well—and is still one of the best plays of its class to be seen at popular prices.

Naturally, as the play is so well known, the work of the members of the Allen company contains the most interest. Miss Vera Felton is an emotional actress above the average of those to be seen playing melodrama, and in the little part she does excellent work. Judging by the standard of the last act alone, Reville Urquhart, the new leading man, although extraordinarily young, is capable. He does not fail to make the character of the hero reasonably life-like. But his enunciation is marred by an affectation—a seeming irrepressible desire to change an ordinary English short "i" into double "e." He does not say "I will kill him," but "I weel keel heem." It doesn't add to the impressiveness of his work. Charles Ayres might have been talking in his sleep for all that he seemed to care or that his audience cared. Forrest Seabury does some good comedy work and William Blake, a new member of the company who unfortunately only appears in the first act, evidently made a very favorable impression on those who saw him.
