

LEGISLATION STATEMENT 1 LEGISLATURE

All Parts of State Seem Determined to Elect Men Pledged to Abide by the Will of the Majority of the People.

Fulton's Supporters Now Declare Friends of Statement Will Vote for Him, Despite His Attitude Towards It.

Reports being brought to Portland from the different parts of the state lead to the belief that a Statement No. 1 legislature will be the result of the primaries tomorrow.

Throughout the state the whole political fight is centering about the nominations for legislative offices. The efforts of the old line machine politicians in Multnomah county and in other parts of the state to defeat Statement No. 1 are being vainly.

The issue therefore has become clearly defined throughout the state. In the strongholds of the old machine which used to run the state the anti-Statement No. 1 sentiment is strong, but out in the rural districts where the mass of the voters reside the opposite is true.

Whatsoever may be the effect of the war waged against Statement No. 1 by Francis J. Heney, it is certain that he has made some decided change in the lineup for and against Statement No. 1.

Reports coming from Multnomah county tell of a great impression made by the prosecutor in his address on Sunday night to elect the representatives of Statement No. 1 and urged the voters to line up behind it in defense of their right to elect the representatives of the United States Senate. His address had a marked effect, even more so than in Portland, and it is believed that it will have a material part in the primary vote for the legislative ticket.

The same is also said to be true of the surrounding districts where his printed speeches have been circulated. From every hand comes the story that back of Statement No. 1 the great mass of the voters of the state are lined up to defend the right voted to themselves in the adoption of the primary law.

Not Senatorial Contest. The other great contest is that between C. W. Fulton and H. M. Calkins for the Republican nomination for United States senator. Each candidate claims the victory of the late primary election to the contention of Mr. Calkins' followers, the Statement No. 1 issue has entered into the senatorial fight, and those who are being the Statement No. 1 people, and that he will get their vote in respect to the fact that he has taken a stand on the issue.

In the belief of those who have followed the fight, the struggle will be a hard one and neither will know which is victorious until all the votes have been counted.

BANKER ADMITS ASSISTING HYDE

E. P. McCormack Says Defendant Secured Public Lands Through Him.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, April 16.—Testifying in the government's suit against John A. Benson and Frederick A. Hyde, accused of land frauds committed in northern California and Oregon, E. P. McCormack, former president of the First National bank of Salem, Oregon, today sprung a surprise by unexpectedly admitting that he had knowingly and freely secured possession of public lands in Oregon through him.

McCormack admitted that he practically acted as Hyde's agent for the filing of land grants. The witness identified a number of letters, one of which is alleged to have been written by Hyde. The letter was signed by Senator Perkins of California and was sent to Hoke Smith, then secretary of the interior.

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CUT IN YELLOW PINE RATE MEANS VICTORY FOR THE NORTHWEST

News received by private dispatch in Portland today of a radical cut in yellow pine lumber rates by southern roads to Minnesota, Nebraska and South Dakota territory, is taken to forecast a victory for Pacific northwest lumbermen in their fight before the interstate commerce commission. The southern roads have filed notice with the commission that May 6 the rates on southern yellow pine to Nebraska, Minnesota and South Dakota will be reduced. The reductions range from 3 to 7 cents per 100 pounds, depending upon the distance.

SERIOUS ROTING WHEN CARS MOVE

Wild Scenes in Chester, Pa., When Strikebreakers Appear—Two Injured.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chester, Pa., April 16.—Wild scenes of rioting today attended an attempt on the part of the streetcar company to operate its cars with strikebreakers brought here from other cities. In one clash between the warring factions a strikebreaker and a special officer employed by the company were seriously wounded. Ten other victims of the riots were removed to the hospital. They were struck by flying missiles. If the police fail in their efforts to suppress the disorder the streetcar company will ask the governor to call out the troops.

(Continued from Page One.) in the legislature. They are Joe L. Hammerly of Gold Hill and Henry D. Kuhl of Applegate. Both stand for the public voters' choice. The Democrats agreed not to put any candidates in the field until the Republicans would bring out Statement No. 1 men. On failure to do so three Democrats entered the field on a Statement No. 1 platform. They are M. Purdin and David H. Miller of Medford, and Jones of Central Point. There is strong Statement No. 1 sentiment throughout the county, and it will probably result in the election of the Democrats. Interest in the primaries is confined to the struggle between E. P. Mulvey, formerly of the Ashland Normal school, and Gus Newbury of Jacksonville, for district attorney in the First district, and the contest between M. F. Eggleston of Ashland and George W. Dunn of Ashland, the present incumbent, for the Republican nomination for county judge. Both fights are bitter. Ed M. Andrews of Medford, the veteran actor and opera singer, is contesting with James Owen of Weiler for the Republican nomination for county commissioner. Dunn and Andrews are making a campaign on the good roads platform. William T. Greive and J. M. Lawton seek the Republican nomination for assessor. There are no other contests for either ticket. But few Democrats are in the field.

In again calling attention to my candidacy for the Republican nomination for Judge of the State Circuit Court, Department No. 1, the position to which I was appointed by the governor to succeed Hon. Arthur L. Frazer, deceased, I wish to say that my time and attention have been so absolutely preoccupied by the accumulation and congestion of judicial business brought about by the enforced holidays of the fall and early winter, that it has been impossible for me either to plan or to put into execution any campaign to advance my political interests. Closely confined to the courtroom every day, it has not been possible for me either to effect an organization of workers or to see the voters personally, or even to address them through personal correspondence. During the three months since taking my seat on the bench, January 7, I have personally tried 45 contested cases, some of which have run through four and five and even six days, and have conducted my court over time and into the night in order to do my part toward keeping the trial docket from running behind. Under these circumstances, I respectfully ask you to accept this public communication through the press as an adequate expression of my desire for your good will and solicitation of your support at the primaries tomorrow, and I earnestly ask my friends to take time to vote.

To the vast number of new voters in our county, I beg to say that my home has been in Portland for nearly 40 years. I received my early education in the public schools of this city and have practiced law here for 18 years. I have paid taxes in this city and county for 20 years, and prior to this year never drew a dollar out of the public treasury.

As to my qualifications for the office, I refer only to my appointment by the governor, which was made entirely without solicitation on my part. Very respectfully, Earl C. Bronaugh
