nomination for senator. This list is involved to a great degree in the Statement No. 1 fight, the issues for and against have been clearly drawn over the state.

Multnomah county is the center of the Statement No. 1 and anti-Statement legislative fight. Here the old-line politicians who used to control the course of the Republican machine reaching throughout the state are making their last desperate effort to regain control wrested from them by the primary law and the indorsement by the people of Statement No. 1.

Here the Hodson-Beach-Bailey-Reed machine combination has joined hands with all the old influences by which politics used to be worked. The Hodson ticket, headed by J. C. Beyer for senator, has called to its aid all of those elements of strength which used to be controlled by the old Matthews-Mitchell machine and expects to win. Its object is to send an unpledged delegation to the legislature by which the senatorial election can be taken back to the floor of the joint assembly and bartered off at one of the old-time 40-day auction sales which used to make the legislative assemblies sensational and useless.

Opposed to the Machine. A list of well-known and prominent men, who though not desiring to become candidates for the legislature, were persuaded by a strong petition of citizens to enter the race, not for the purpose of holding office, but for the protection of a principle in which they believed. In the list are Ben Selling, C. W. Nottingham, Dan Kellaher, H. R. Albee and A. H. Willett, candidates for the senate; W. C. Belt, for joint representative from Clackamas and Multnomah counties; James D. Abbott, B. C. Altman, Fred J. Brady, J. C. Bryant, J. F. Cassidy, W. J. Clemens, K. C. Couch, L. M. Davis, E. J. Jaeger, L. D. Mahone, Charles J. McDonald and A. W. Orton, candidates for representatives.

All of these men are firm believers in the principle that the United States senator should be elected by the people, and through this belief are subscribers to Statement No. 1, which gives the people the right to express their choice at the polls in June.

Strong for statement No. 1. Sentiment in Multnomah county among the great mass of the voters is strong for Statement No. 1. In Portland, where the machine politicians have their stronghold, a bitter fight will be waged against the Statement No. 1 candidates. Even here, however, the reports coming from shop and factory and from the people generally, are to the effect that the people who believe in their right to rule themselves will stand solid behind the Statement No. 1 candidates at the polls tomorrow.

The voters have come to recognize that the legislative battle now being waged is more than a simple ballot for men; it is one for principle. They have seen that the defeat of Statement No. 1 means a step backward for the state and a relapse to old political conditions where the machine named the policies and the people voted as they were told. 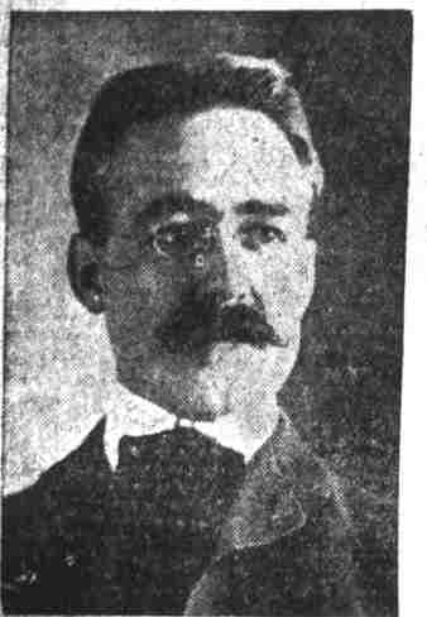

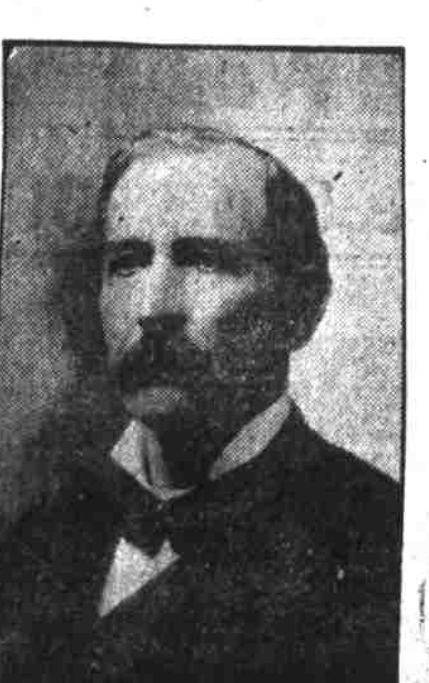

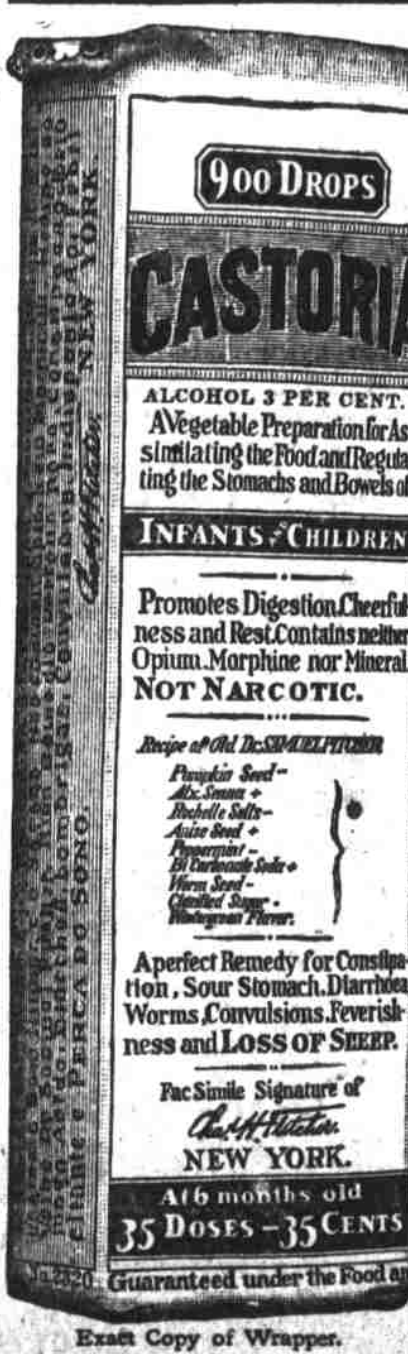
## WOODMEN TO TAKE IN MANY CANDIDATES

Special cars from Vancouver, Troutdale and Oregon City will reach the city this evening, bringing large classes of candidates from those places. These will be met by the companies of the uniform rank of local Woodmen and conducted to the W. O. W. temple. The uniform rank will also escort the head officers from the Portland hotel to the temple. Following the business session and initiatory exercises refreshments will be served by the local committee.

## TAKE BACK MEN FOR OFFICES ON SOUND
