

HOUSE MEMBERS ARE SEASICK

The Democratic Filibuster Makes Republicans Yearn for Early Adjournment.

Washington, April 17.—Once so peaceful—even to the point of being careless—the house, with the Democratic filibuster in full swing, is now in the grip of a hurricane, and some of the seasick members are praying that the day may soon come when they will reach the port of adjournment. So roughly was the old legislative ship tossed when Republican "Whip" Watson got back from Indiana with the gubernatorial nomination tucked under his arm, that he didn't like it a bit, and so set about to get the house and senate leaders to agree to go home by May 10. He may succeed, but those who have now grown accustomed to the rough weather are not quite so anxious. They say that even Watson will get used to it by and by.

Whatever effect the filibuster to "make the majority enact remedial legislation recommended by their president" may have in the coming election, it has served to give John Sharp Williams, minority leader and senator-elect, a standing he has not had with his party for years. As a result, some admirers are actually mentioning the Mississippi as a vice-presidential possibility.

Although Williams and Speaker Cannon engage in daily verbal combat, their contests have served only to increase the personal friendship between the two legislative giants.
"There will be no personal misunderstanding between the chair and the gentleman from Mississippi," "Uncle Joe" assured Williams one day when the minority leader was calling Cannon names in as soft and delicate parliamentary language as the smallest scholar from the south could employ. And there has not been. When the speaker goes down on the floor to stretch his legs, he lounges in Williams' seat. Just as if he owned it and Williams drifts into the speaker's room at will, just as if the latch string had an invisible extension to his trousers pocket. With the house going first this way and that under the gag rules of the majority, the members generally are becoming accustomed to the disturbed conditions.

DUCAL COUPLE'S SILVER WEDDING

Fetes in Honor of Duke of Genoa Who Once Refused Crown of Spain.

Rome, April 17.—Genoa has been the scene of great festivities this week in celebration of the silver wedding anniversary of the Duke and Duchess of Genoa. The duke is the only brother of the dowager queen of Italy, and an uncle, therefore, of King Victor Emmanuel III. The wedding feast, which was attended by many members of the Italian royal family, among them the king and queen, the duke and duchess of Abruzzi, the duke and duchess of Genoa, are very popular throughout the kingdom, because of their benevolence.
The Duke of Genoa has visited America several times in his capacity of an admiral of the Italian navy. He is a great admirer of the English and Americans, which is probably due to the fact that he received his education in England. When he was a child he was sent to school at Harrow, and many amusing stories are related of his experiences there. In 1863 the cortes decided to offer the crown of Spain to the duke, who was then a young student at Harrow. When the news went abroad that the offer had been accepted all of the 500 boys in the school kicked the duke, with the laudable ambition of being able to go in after life that they had kicked the king. This was a little premature, for, unluckily, King Victor Emmanuel, fearing dynastic complications, compelled his nephew to reject the proffered crown. So the hapless duke got all of the kicks and none of the glory.
The Duchess of Genoa is a Bavarian princess, daughter of the late Prince Adalbert of Bavaria and sister of Prince Louis Ferdinand, who has achieved wide fame as an obstetrician. 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WILL U. S. WHIP CASTRO'S ARMY?

Administration in Delicate Position Because of Former Attitude.

Washington, April 17.—The administration frankly admits being annoyed by the Venezuelan situation.
That serious consideration has been given to the proposition to send an armed force to that country to enforce respect for the United States government cannot be successfully denied. The war and navy departments have been collaborating on tentative plans for the embarkation of troops and the investment of LaGuayra. These are now said to have been completed so that if congress should decide to clothe the president with the necessary authority, the army and navy will be ready to do the rest on short notice.
One thing stands in the way of spanking President Castro and that is the high minded position which the United States has taken with reference to the use of arms to enforce contractual obligations. Most of the claims of American citizens against Castro are based on alleged violation of concessional rights. Moreover, there is considerable doubt in the mind of administration officials here as to whether all of these claimants have come into court with clean hands. The recent correspondence sent to the senate by the state department showed that in one case, at least, the claimant had aided and abetted a revolution against the constituted authority of Venezuela. This government, however, has never passed upon the validity of the claims. It has merely insisted that the claimants submit the controversies to an international tribunal for arbitration. This demand made repeatedly in the past two years has not only been refused by Castro but that in most undiplomatic, practically insulting language.
If it should be found necessary to go to war, the resulting operations would be in the nature of a picnic excursion, in the view of army and navy officials here. The Venezuelan army is composed of seven antiquated cruisers, and three small auxiliaries. Its "army" numbers about 4,000 men, poorly equipped, ill paid and miserably disciplined.

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HEBREWS CELEBRATE FEAST OF PASSOVER

Festival to Commemorate Departure of Children of Israel From Egypt.

New York, April 17.—Jewish people throughout the world are today celebrating the Passover. This festival, which is also known as the Feast of Unleavened Bread, was instituted to commemorate the departure of the

children of Israel from Egypt, under the leadership of Moses, where they had been held in bondage for upward of 400 years.
The reformed Jews, as well as the orthodox Jews, who adhere religiously to all the wonderful symbolism and ritual which make Jewish worship picturesque and beautiful, observe the Passover feast, which means more to the Jew than any other of his religious celebrations. The reformed Jews do not adhere so closely to all the symbolism of the celebration, but their observances differ only in that they are not so elaborate.
The feature of the celebration is the substitution of unleavened cakes, or matzos, prepared for the purpose, for bread in the household of the orthodox Hebrew. Each year, as Passover approaches, thousands of pounds of matzos are baked for the occasion, and it is estimated that in the upper east side alone more than 10,000 matzos are required for the poor families. The annual sale from the bakeries throughout the city is so large that it requires large moving vans to take them to the

various points of distribution. This is not surprising when the fact is borne in mind that New York city contains more Jewish inhabitants than any other half dozen cities of the world combined.
The night ushering in the Passover festival is known as Seder night, and is made the occasion of a family gathering devoted to a special service around the supper table, which is decked out in a peculiar manner with matzos and other accessories incidental to the feast. Gathered around the table, the "Hagadah" is read and recited.
The "Hagadah" contains a narrative of the deliverance of the Jews from their Egyptian bondage as set forth in the Bible, and is read by the head of the household, either in the original Hebrew or as an English translation. The other members of the family join in the responses or in the singing of hymns of praise and thanksgiving to their divine liberator.
The Passover continues for eight days, but only the first and last days are celebrated as holy days. In the large number of Hebrew synagogues in Greater New York, both reformed

and orthodox, services were held this morning and sermons appropriate to the occasion were preached.
