HOLD COMPANY TO CONTRACT

Executive Board Inclined to Insist on Pacific Bridge Completing Fill.

It is up to the Pacific Bridge company to finish the East Sixth street fill on contract time or lose its bond. Members of the street committee of the city executive board refused to grant the company an extension of 150 days at a meeting yesterday afternoon and will make an investigation of the conditions in the next two weeks before taking final action.
The Sixth street fill is from East Sherman to Division and has been opposed by the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company. In a council meeting several months ago C. F. Swigert, president of the bridge company, served verbal notice on the city that the company would not make the fill because the mill company would not pay its assessment. Inasmuch as the lumber company is the only property owner on the site of the fill its refusal meant that the bridge company would not get any money for its work.
At the committee meeting yesterday George W. Simons, general manager of the Pacific Bridge company, denied that his company would refuse to make the fill. Mayor Lane told Simons yesterday that he favored holding the company to a strict accounting in the matter and would force it to complete the fill on time.
Since the agitation against the fill was started by the lumber company it has brought in a proposition to the effect that it will pay the entire cost of filling in Grand avenue if the proceeding on Sixth street are discontinued. Councilman Willis will introduce a resolution to this effect at the next council meeting.
Property owners on East Sixth street are strongly opposed to discontinuing the fill. They have improved the street from a poor street to a street of Division street to Washington street. All the work is done save the fill, and the property owners say the money they spent improving the street south of the gulch will be wasted unless the fill is made.
Simons pleaded for the time extension on the ground that the company was at work on another improvement. He said that as soon as the other improvements are completed his company will finish the fill. Mayor Lane and the committee were not satisfied with this and postponed final action until the next meeting of the committee.

MAINE AND ALABAMA WILL STAY ON COAST

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Navy Yard, Puget Sound, Wash., April 17.—That the battleships Maine and Alabama will be detached from the Atlantic fleet and left on this coast in exchange for the battleships Wisconsin and Nebraska is the construction which officials here place on a telegram received from Rear Admiral Capps, chief of the bureau of construction and repair. The order changes the docking schedule for ships of the Atlantic fleet at this navy yard. According to the telegram, the Maine and Alabama are the Georgia, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Virginia, Maine and Alabama. His telegram is as follows:
"Commandant Navy Yard, Puget Sound, Wash.—Georgia, New Jersey, Rhode Island and Virginia will dock at Puget sound instead of Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio and Culgoa. Maine and Alabama will be docked after departure of fleet."

FULTON AGAIN FLAYS PROSECUTOR HENEY

Last Speech of Campaign Delivered on the East Side.

Before an audience that filled the hall in the Burkhardt building last night Senator Charles W. Fulton delivered his last address of the campaign, defending himself from the attacks made upon him by Francis J. Heney.
The address made by the senator was largely a repetition of the one made by him in the Armory on Tuesday night, and those which he has delivered throughout the state during the past two weeks.
The speaker flayed Mr. Heney in his remarks, as he has done throughout his tour of the state, contending that the prosecutor had been unfair and maliciously untrue in his attack upon him. He quoted from letters and other documents in support of his argument and held that in the presentation of his charges Mr. Heney had distorted the facts, twisted the import of letters, and otherwise acted in an unfair and wrongful manner. He referred to him as a hyena masquerading in sheep's clothing, and said that he was like a dog with the hydrophobia running about the country snapping at every one in his path.
Fulton contended that Heney was actuated by malicious motives engendered because Senator Fulton had opposed his appointment as a special prosecutor to try the land fraud cases.
Rufus Mallory presided at the meeting, while the platform was lined with a number of the old-time friends of the speaker.
