Evidence of Loss of Vessel Lands on Vancouver Island.

Victoria, B. C., April 18.-Wreckage s reported near Carmanah that indicates, according to Lighthouse Keeper Daykin, that some vessel has recently

Daykin, that some vessel has recently met disaster. His report, sent late lest night, says:

"A quantity of wreckage has come ashore six miles east of Carmanah. It includes two large boat chocks, about five feet long, of hardwood with galvanized hinges; three tin trunks, broken; part of sixth hatchway, marked port forward, broken: a topmast, evidently of rome large ship; a lot of painted lumber; a hardwood tumbler rack over six feet long; four 18-foot oars; broken parts of a vessel's bits, seven feet long, 18 inches square; a teak copper capped stem of a small gig but no marks to identify it by. All the above came ashore and it looks as if the wreck occurred recently."

GOES ON LONG VOYAGE.

Tug North King Ready to Leave for Bristol Bay.

The Portland-Alaska Packers' company's tug North King leaves down this afternoon for Bristol bay in command of Captain Cantillon. 
