

**PLAN CARNIVAL TO PAY DEBT**

**Catholic Young Men's Club to Make Use of Streets.**

Arrangements for the carnival and street fair to be given by the Catholic Young Men's club of the east side are progressing rapidly under the direction of Joe M. Meyer, who has full charge of the details in connection with the festival, and the affair promises to be a great success.

Already about 20,000 10-cent single admission tickets have been sold by the members of the organization, and within a week or so another ticket-selling campaign will be inaugurated. It is expected that 50,000 alone will be realized from the sale of tickets in this way, which will nearly wipe out the indebtedness of \$5,000 now hanging over the institution recently erected at Williams avenue and Morris street. When the building is fully equipped it will represent an outlay of approximately \$15,000.

The carnival and fair will open May 16 and will continue for 10 days. The club has received permission from the city council to use Morris street east of Williams avenue, for a distance of about three blocks, and there the street fair will be held.

Arrangements are being made for a big automobile parade through the principal streets of Portland the morning of the opening day of the carnival, said Mr. Meyer today. "In the cars will be those who are to take part in the entertainments and shows on 'The Stroll.' In the evening of the opening day there will be a grand ball in the auditorium of the clubhouse, and the following evenings there will be boxing matches and other athletic events.

Those who will take part in the fair and carnival will be purely local men, so that we will not have to pay out enormous percentages of the profits to professional showmen. The country store alone will be a big money-making proposition, as the goods to be sold there will all be donated. Portland merchants have been extremely liberal, and to show our appreciation of their liberality we have arranged for a manufacturers' exhibit, for which no charge will be made.

About 400 young men already have joined the club, and within a short time we expect to double that number. Our apparatus has not yet been installed, but will be immediately after the carnival. When everything is completed we will have one of the finest athletic organizations on the coast. While it is called the Catholic Young Men's club, persons of any denomination will be admitted to membership, with the proper indorsement.

Forest Grove, Or., April 18.—The Catholic residents of Roy, a small town four miles northeast of here on the Hillsboro-Buxton railroad, will erect a parochial school and church building to cost \$2,500. The lower floor will be used for a school and the upper floor as a chapel.

In former years the children of the Roy neighborhood have attended the parochial school at Verboort, but that community has grown so rapidly that the facilities will no longer accommodate the number of pupils wishing to attend. Archbishop Christie has hence created a new parish at Roy for that reason.

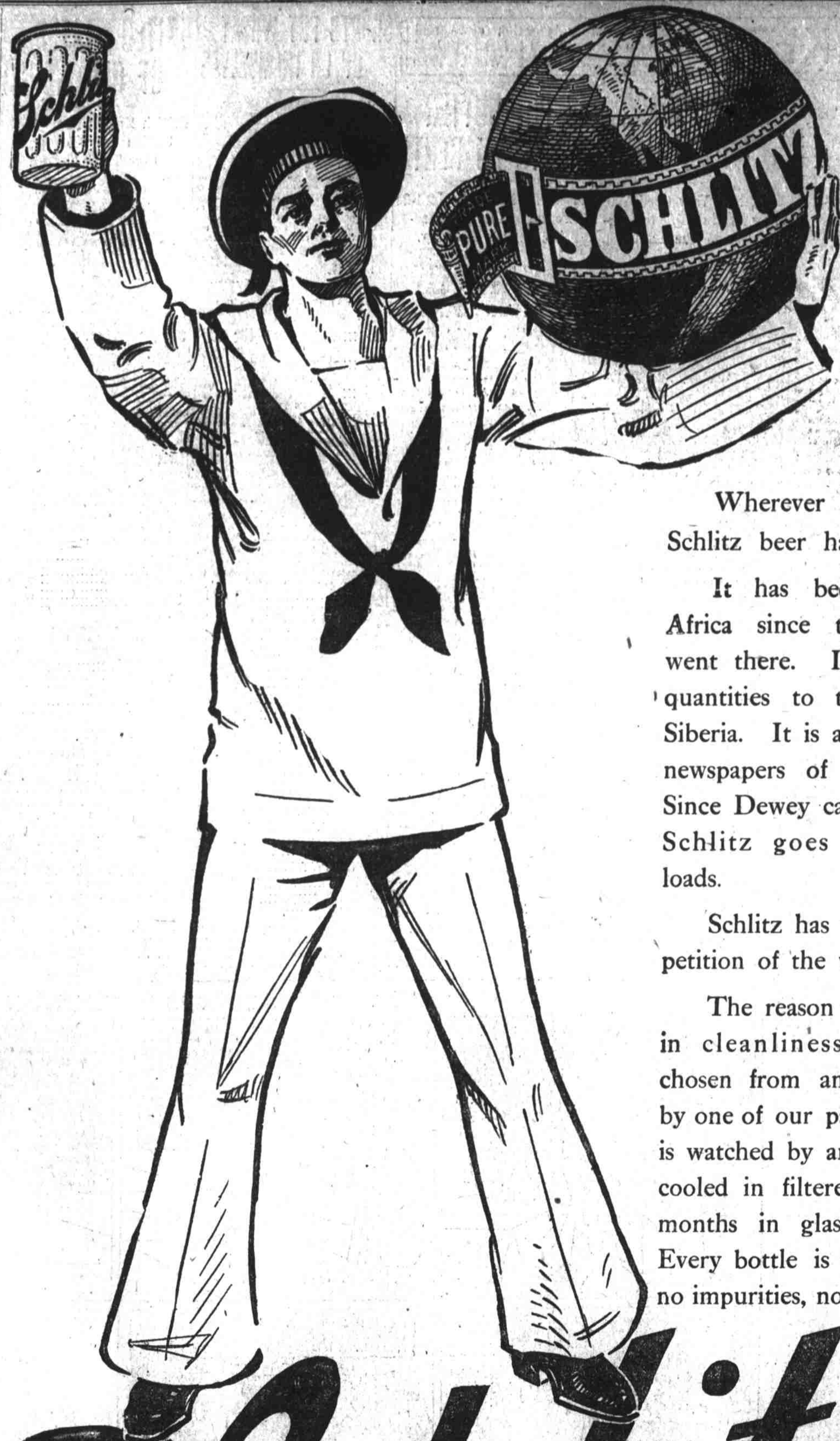
The new church will be in charge of Rev. Father Kettnerhofen, at one time a member of the Chicago bar, but for the past year assistant to Father Verboort at Verboort.
