

M'CARREN ON WAR PATH

Ousted Tammany Leader Back on Job Through Trick—Promises to Stir Up Fuss at Denver Convention.

(United Press Special Wire.)
New York, April 18.—The Democratic national convention at Denver is going to see the biggest display of political pyrotechnics let off in years, when State Senator Patrick H. McCarren of Brooklyn, ousted from the state convention, and read out of the party last Wednesday, begins fighting to seat his King's county delegation.

This was the declaration of McCarren's friends today. The senator personally voiced his intention of putting up a fight that will open the delegates' eyes when he goes before the committee on credentials.

A trick McCarren turned today on State Chairman Fingy Connors and Leader Murphy of Tammany, has caused those stout politicians to pay more attention to the Brooklyn man's threats.

After being ousted from the state convention, and told he would never be allowed to sit in that body again, McCarren is tonight back on the job. He induced Conrad Hazenflug, the only McCarren man left on the committee, to give him his proxy during the remainder of the term. Hazenflug was allowed to remain upon the committee because Connors and Murphy thought he had been won away from McCarren.

That another state convention will be called to send a contesting delegation now seems almost certain. McCarren declared, however, that irrespective of this, he will take the Brooklyn contest to Denver and make a fuss that will startle the convention.

FLOWERS FOR EASTER COST A NEAT \$25,000

And When the Bills for the Spring Hats Follow the Florists' Reminders Portland Will Realize That Easter Has Certainly Been Here.

Never before has Portland spent as much money for Easter as it has this spring, according to dealers in clothing, flowers and Easter specialties.

One florist said that the flower bill of Portland's young men for today will not be less than \$25,000, and will probably be nearer \$35,000. The candy shops have been doing an unprecedented business, while the department stores for the past few days have taken on the appearance of the week before Christmas. Up to a late hour last night the stores were thronged, and it was almost impossible to make one's way through them.

Hats, dresses and articles of clothing of course headed the Easter bill which will be presented to the head of the family two weeks hence, but it does not end with anything so substantial as clothing. After you have gone down the list of hats, gloves, dresses, shoes, scarves and such expensive little trifles as you will find a nice item from the florists.

Max Smith, who is well informed on the amount of sales of cut flowers and

potted plants, said last night that not a cent less than \$25,000 had been spent up to 6 o'clock last evening for Easter flowers, and it is believed that the florists' bills will go away beyond that figure. For instance 10,000 Easter lilies alone were sold, and at the lowest estimate that means a single item of \$10,000. Then, counting in the violets, lilies of the valley, roses, carnations and other flowers which were sold so extensively, and the unlimited may have some idea of what Easter means to the Portland florists.

After reaching the bottom of the florist's itemized statement the family man will come across the confectioner's bill. Candy eggs, candy rabbits and other Easter like animals, to say nothing of the filling chocolate eggs, awful ham and egg concoctions made out of confectionery, with real striped bacon apparently gracing the candy dish and other similar inventions of the confectioner's imagination, all cost money and help to swell the Easter shopping fund.

All in all, it is safe to say that Portland's shopping bill for the past week amounted to several hundred thousand dollars.

SILVER TROWEL ARRIVES TODAY

Masonic Emblem Nearing Portland on Journey Around the World.

Starting from New York October 30, 1905, on a journey around the world, the Masonic silver trowel, symbolic of the admonition to "spread the cement of brotherly love," will arrive in Portland today, and tomorrow evening it will be received by Williamette lodge No. 2, A. The trowel will come to Portland in charge of the following committee from Portneuf lodge, Pocatello, Idaho: Rev. F. Murphy, William Wallin, N. D. Brookheart and D. Worth Clark, and after its rest here it will be taken in hand by a committee of Portland Masons and carried to its next temporary abiding place and so on until it has completely circled the globe, everywhere spreading fraternal feeling and bringing together in a closer bond of acquaintance the Masons of the world.

Elaborate preparations have been made for the reception of the trowel by members of the order in this city. A banquet will be served, at which Worshipful Master Frank Robertson will act as toastmaster and the following toasts will be responded to: "The Entered Apprentice," M. W. Bro. William F. Butler, P. LOST \$13,000 IN DEN RAID

Allegation Made by Chinese Against Chief, Bruin, Captain and Patrolmen.

As the result of a raid made by the police on December 2, at 33 Second street, where Chinese gambling games were supposed to have been in operation, Lee Lane, Hue Sing and Yop Sue, filed suit in the United States court yesterday against Chief Grimsmecher, Captain Bailey, former Inspector Bruin and eight patrolmen to recover \$13,385.50 which the plaintiffs claim they lost as a result of the actions of the police.

Lee Lane and the two other Chinese were doing business under the name of Bow Wo & Co. They claim to have been doing a general merchandise and banking business. The eight patrolmen who are mentioned as being responsible, together with the three officers for their loss are Charles Porter, Glenn F. Howard, L. K. Evans, C. A. Tennant, J. H. Edgerton, Ernest Johnson, R. R. Phillips and J. L. Wendorf.

OUT OF WORK AND NOW WIFE WORRIES

William Liebelt Is Missing, and His Family Is Left Destitute.

F. J. Berger, who lives at 858 East Thirteenth street north, has reported to

the police the unexplained disappearance of William Liebelt, whose home is at 900 East Twelfth street north. Liebelt left home on the morning of April 10 and has not since been seen by any of the members of his family.

Mrs. Liebelt and her five children are in destitute circumstances, and unless the husband is found at once they will be forced to depend upon the charitable aid of neighbors for the necessities of life. Friends of Liebelt fear that he may have committed suicide, as he is known to have been very dependent because of his inability to get work and thus provide for his family. Liebelt is described as being 35 years old; weight about 150 pounds; 5 feet high; light complexion; light colored beard and mustache. He has some friends in Oregon City and his brother lives in North Dakota.
