

# TRAINING SHIP FOR PORTLAND

### Admirer of Good Seamen Says School Would Prove a Fine Asset.

## NEED MEN FOR COAST AND NAVY

### Suggests That Vessel of Same Character as the Enterprise at Boston Be Stationed Here—Ship Would Give Boys Opportunity.

That a state school ship for the training of seamen for the navy as well as the merchant marine should be located at Portland is the opinion of Theodore Barker of the United States lighthouse service, who takes deep interest in the development of shipping under Uncle Sam's colors.

He says the location here of a training ship of that class would mean education for hundreds of young men who stand little opportunity of getting a seafaring education in the coastwise trade and material of the best kind for the navy in time of need. "A training ship for young men would prove of great value to Portland," said Mr. Barker, "and I hope that some day before long it will succeed in getting out. At Boston the ship Enterprise has brought out many a young man who, perhaps otherwise would have amounted to nothing. Many of the best officers in the navy today are graduates from the Enterprise and many prominent men in other walks of life spent their younger days there getting an education."

"We should have a large ship, one that could accommodate 500 or more cadets. There would be no trouble in getting material because boys come here often asking for information how to get into the navy. They would join if there was a ship here, but tell them to go to Bremerton or Mare Island and they stop, in many cases they haven't got the money to pay fares. The ship would prove an attraction, too, and not a little revenue would be derived therefrom, because the boys would get some, and it would mean a few thousand dollars worth of new business to the city every month.

## WASHINGTON BANS PRIVATE GAMBLING

He was arrested on a charge of conducting a gambling resort and convicted of the lesser charge of "conducting and carrying on a game of roulette." He appealed and the decision is affirmed by the supreme court.
