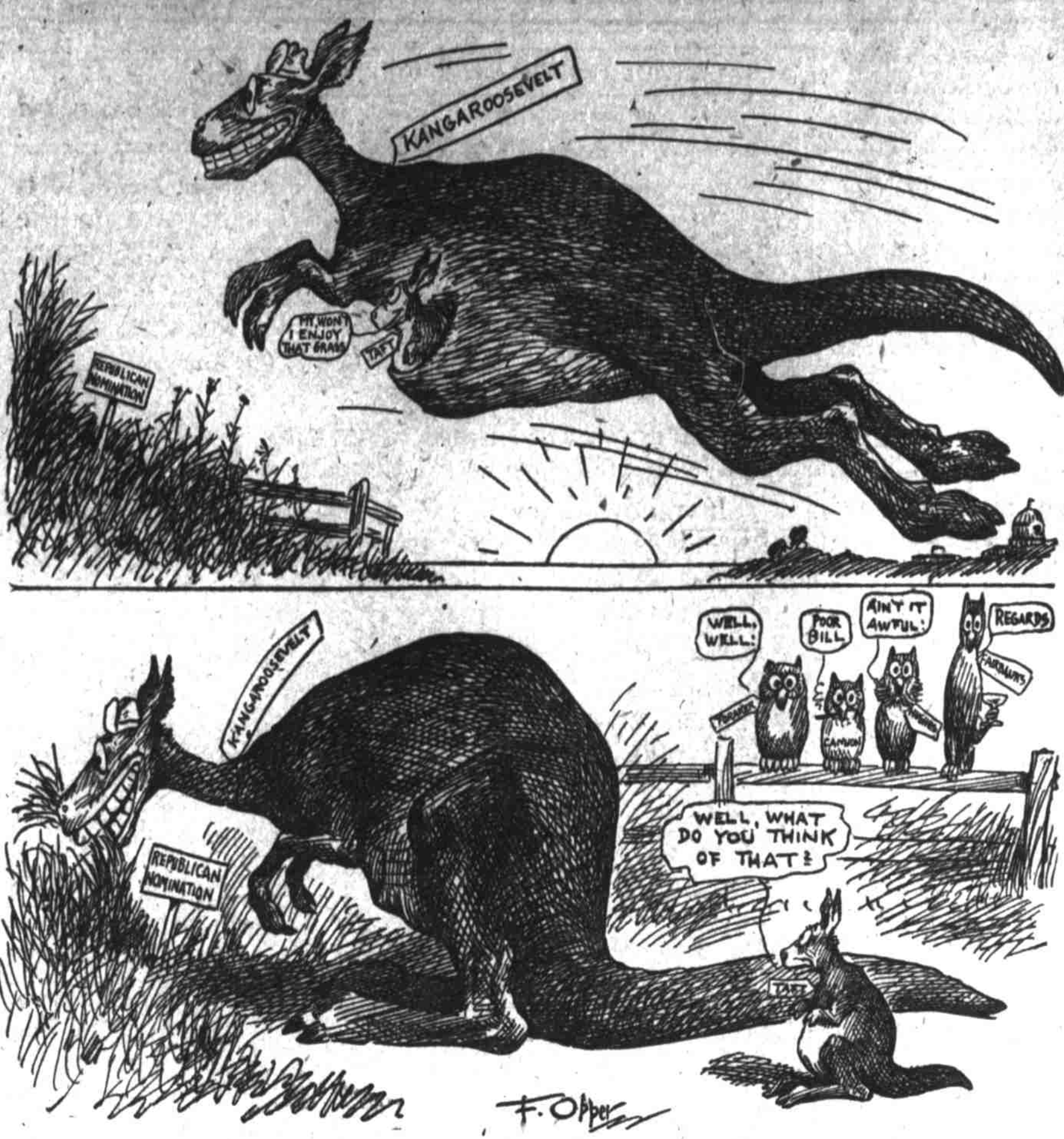

lan at the Palace has never before been received with even lukewarm sentiment in England. For the essence of the dance which is eastern in that it is dramatic. . . . What was the dance of the Shulamite, danced in the 'Song of Songs,' which led to the outbreak of 'How beautiful are thy feet with shoes, O prince's daughter,' and the glowing imagery that follows? It was a dance clearly with some sort of story in it. All of Miss Allan's dances are dramatic, and, most of all, the wonderful Salome.

Beautiful Dance. "We know now how Salome danced, not to a tune, as in some medieval illustrations, nor tumbling, standing on her head as in others, but clothed with jewels and with those marvellously beautiful sinuous movements in which the dancer's will and emotions play upon the lovely instrument of her body to produce what music she will. The beauty of these movements there is no describing.

"Did Miss Allan realize, when she came to London, how bold a thing she was doing? It was nothing less than beginning our education in a branch of art which we have persistently neglected, and, mainly through our unbecoming suspicion of its propriety. Courage is usually rewarded and Miss Allan has conquered. Night after night crowds flock to see this princess of the first time in the head of her victim and, having won it, go through a torrent of mingled passions over it—all submitted by art into a thing of beauty. And so far there has been no whisper of ribaldry or prudery. Not all the visitors to the Palace, we suspect, have read Browning's 'The Lady and the Painter,' but it looks as if all realize when Miss Allan dances the 'absolution,' in the poet's mistaken phrase, won by artist's model and dancer alike."

NEIGHBORLY FRICTION TO WEAR AWAY FOURTEEN INCHES OF EAVES

Alleging that her neighbor is encroaching on a lot she owns by building a fence 10 inches over the line and leaving a chicken-house and the house eaves to project six inches and 14 inches, respectively, Mafie Engh has begun suit in the circuit court to restrain Mary A. Cass from building the fence and to compel her to move the chicken-house and the house eaves.

Just how the plaintiff expects the house eaves to shrink 14 inches is not explained. All she asks is that these 14 inches of overhanging eaves be removed. As it is, she explains, these eaves shed volumes of water into her yard when it rains, but she is satisfied with the water that falls on her own lot, without receiving a downpour from her neighbor's house.

The plaintiff is building a house on the lot in question, described as fractional lot 6, in block 329, Portland, and she says the work is obstructed by the Cass fence, as she needs all the land she owns for her own use.

RESTORING COMPLEXIONS
