

# EX-DEWEY PASSES AWAY

## Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman Dies at London— Party War Probable Result of Death of Man Who Kept Peace for Years.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
London, April 22.—Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, who recently resigned the premiership because of poor health, is dead and a pall of gloom has been spread over the United Kingdom. The end, which was peaceful, came this morning.  
Sir Henry sacrificed his life to the demands of his country. Instead of taking the care that his physical condition required, he continued to perform his strenuous duties until his system had run down so completely that he was compelled to take to his bed. His death probably will be followed by a split in the liberal party such as occurred among the Democrats on the first nomination of William J. Bryan for the presidency. The severance of the liberals into a radical and a conservative wing will mean the return of the conservatives to power.  
Party War Feared.  
Sir Henry was the only man among the liberal leaders with the gift of conciliation and it has been his personality alone that has kept together the divergent elements that compose the liberal party. With his death, internal party warfare is certain to break out among the extreme radicals and the number about 100 of the present liberal majority in the house of commons which is about 150. At this time the radicals have in their power to defeat the government by an adverse vote on a party measure and thus precipitate a new general election.  
Several times during the illness of Sir Henry there have been indications of revolt and the breach that has been opened since the first of the year cannot be closed. The radicals declare that the only measure of sufficient importance to require the attention of parliament are those dealing with social reform, and particularly with the elimination of the extreme poverty that exists throughout Great Britain. The radicals are against the maintenance of a great navy and want the money expended on new battleships to be used to give every man the right to employment.  
Asquith Is Fugitive.  
Mr. Asquith, the new premier, it is said, is not the type of man to pacify the liberal revolution. He is a fighter and a strict disciplinarian and belongs to the liberal imperialist group which acknowledged Lord Rosebery as its chief, until the retirement of Rosebery from active politics. Mr. Asquith has no sympathy for the program of the extreme radicals and his temperament is such that he cannot more see their side than they see his. He is a sympathizer with the Bryanites.  
It is reported that Winston Churchill, under secretary for the colonies, may be persuaded by the radicals to become their leader. Mr. Churchill, who is the most brilliant young member of the house of commons, is radical in his opinions, but he is also very ambitious and he may desire to risk his political future by leading a party revolt.  
Lloyd George, the president of the board of trade, a close rival of Mr. Churchill, also is mentioned as a possible radical revolutionary leader, but

# U. S. ARMY NEEDS MORE OFFICERS

## Courts Martial Have but Ten Men Because of Secrecy.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, April 22.—Two general courts-martial have been appointed by the war department for the trial of such persons as may be brought before them, one to meet at Fort Mifflin, Pennsylvania, and the other at Fort Lincoln, North Dakota. The details consist of 10 officers each. The details in the orders announcing the details is that a greater number of officers cannot be assembled "without manifest injury to the service."  
A general court-martial should ordinarily consist of 15 members. The small number of officers on these boards is due to the great secrecy of officers in the various regiments at the military posts throughout the country.

# TENNIS PLAYER NEXT SECRETARY

## President May Appoint Bacon to Taft's Place If Latter Retires.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, April 22.—The next secretary of war will probably be a member of the president's "tennis cabinet." Although Secretary Taft denies any present intention of resigning his portfolio, he intimates that if he is nominated for president at the Republican convention in June he will forthwith resign as an official of the administration. The man most prominently mentioned now for his place is Robert Bacon, assistant secretary of state, formerly a partner of J. Pierpont Morgan, and now one of the exterior of government chiefs which assembles every pleasant afternoon on the tennis courts back of the White House.  
The president not only admires Bacon for his prowess with the racket, but has a high opinion of his administrative abilities as demonstrated in his work in the state department under the tutelage of Secretary Root.  
Among others mentioned for the post are Bookman Winthrop, assistant secretary of the treasury, and formerly governor of Porto Rico, and the present assistant secretary of war, General Oliver. Governor Magoon of Cuba has also been suggested, but it is not believed that he can yet be spared from the island.

# LOEB ADMITS HE WILL BE TRACTION MAGNATE

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, April 22.—In a letter to Representative Sims explaining his ownership of 100 shares of the Washington Railway & Electric company, Secretary Loeb practically admits that in the near future, probably not until President Roosevelt's term expires, he will acquire the presidency of that traction corporation. The letter was written to Sims in response to his statement made in the house that the president's private secretary owned 4,700 shares of the stock. After reminding the representative that he should be more careful in referring to men's characters, Loeb wrote:  
"Forty-seven hundred shares of the capital stock of the Washington Railway & Electric company stand in my name on the books of the company. One hundred of these, enough to enable me to qualify as a director, are mine. 4,600 are holdings of friends of mine for whom I simply acted as representative at the last annual meeting. I am a holder of which I was elected a director with the view to my possible election as president of the company if I decided to take up that line of work after leaving official life."  
Sims explained that in fairness to Secretary Loeb he desired to have the letter given publicity.

# SCIENTIST CLAIMS GREAT DISCOVERY

London, April 22.—Dr. Romme, after devoting many years of his life to a secret scientific investigation, claims to have discovered that there is a pre-determination of sex—that there is a law which determines whether boys or girls shall be born. In an article published in the Revue Scientifique, a disciple of Professor Schenck, declares a boy is born when the father is the weaker and the girl is born when the mother is the weaker. By the law of nature, he says, a child resembles the weaker and not the stronger parent, and adds that in all countries with mathematical regularity 108 or 109 girls are born to every 100 boys. He declares this proportion is only modified after a great war.
