

# STAGE COMPANY SUED FOR \$61,000

### Former Treasurer of Wash- ington Asks Heavy Dam- ages for Injuries.

C. W. Maynard, of Olympia and Chehalis, former state treasurer of Washington, filed suit against the Umqua River Steam Navigation company of Gardiner, Oregon, for \$61,000 personal damages in the United States circuit court this morning, on the grounds that he had been severely injured and crippled as the result of a stage coach accident near Scotchburg, Oregon, in March last year.
