

DESIRE FOR IRON HORSE

Cortelyou Says People Urged Government to Make Concessions to Railroad Corporations in Matter of Public Lands.

Syracuse, April 22.—Ex-Postmaster General George B. Cortelyou was a speaker at the annual banquet of the Syracuse chamber of commerce last night. During his address Mr. Cortelyou dwelt upon the power of the government for use for the benefit of the people. Referring to government land grants Mr. Cortelyou said in part:

"The grants of land made by the general government to the several states for the purpose of aiding in the construction of railroads were usually turned over to corporations to do the desired work, and the anxious were the people to get the iron horse to their doors that such safeguards as the opportunity of the public were not erected. Some of the states have, by reason of availing themselves of later opportunity, somewhat remedied the oversight, while some in their zeal have gone too far. But the failure to attend to the matter when proper provision might have been made makes more difficult the supervision which the sovereign power ought to be able to exercise over its creations.

Cause of Legislation.

"Because of the many controversies that have arisen between grantor and grantee all over the land, in the case of franchises for the use of public utility, giving rise to almost constant litigation, in many cases to corruption, just such an our theorist declared would be attendant upon works done by government directly, and in the majority of instances to a disregard of the rights of the public, supervision, in greater or less degree, had become a necessity, and the establishment of this supervision is in the line of a due regard for the public welfare.

"And let me say, too, that along the line of its fostering care over business interests, government care at the moment do several things that will be of benefit to the country. It can give us such legislation as will fortify us against financial disturbance and furnish us with a supply of currency adequate for the needs of our business community in all sections and at all seasons of the year. I believe this will be done. So that with a temporary device, if nothing further can be had at this time, and with provision for a permanent commission to study and report upon the question, we shall make progress toward a wise solution of this vastly important problem.

Weakness Subsidy.

"It can give us, also, such legislation, through the simple measure now before the congress as will encourage the up-building of our merchant marine, so specially essential to our commercial interests in Central and South America and on the Pacific coast.

Senator Bourne's Scrivener Tells What G. O. P. Convention Will Do.

Medford, Or., April 21.—Roosevelt and Fairbanks will be nominated by the national Republican convention when it meets in Chicago, said John C. Young of Baker City, private secretary to Jonathan Bourne, who spent the day in Medford on a mission of secrecy, presumably looking after Bourne's interests and feeling the public pulse. "It is the field against Taft," continued Mr. Young, "and the field will win. Taft will not have over 150 votes. When it is seen after the first few ballots that Taft cannot win, Indiana will lead the break to Roosevelt. Nebraska will follow and there will soon be a stampede. Indiana will lead the break because Fairbanks is willing to remain vice-president if he cannot be president. The bolt will be with the understanding that he is again named. Hemingway cannot be reelected without Fairbanks' aid, and the program will be agreeable to both him and Beveridge.

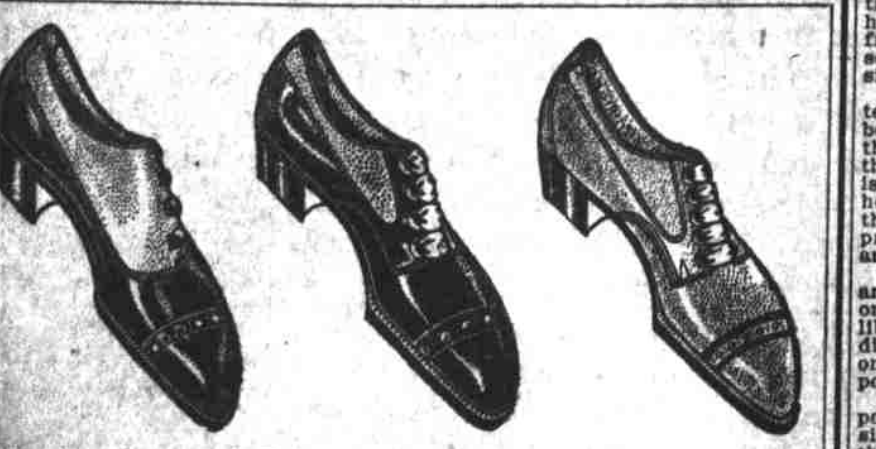
