WILL NOT WORK ELMORE'S CARGO

Longshoremen Boycott the Steamer Upon Arrival From Tillamook.

NONUNION MEN SECURED AT ONCE

Steamer Brings Large Shipment of Cheese From Factories on Prosperous Bay—Encounters Rough Weather Between Bay and River.

Nonunion longshoremen are discharging freight from the Portland-Tillamook liner Sus H. Elmore, the union stevedores having quit when they learned

upon the arrival of the craft this morning that she carried nonunion sailors. No trouble was experienced getting men to do the work since Captain Schroeder offered to pay them the regular union rate, which is 50 cents an hour, and the hold will be ready to receive freight this afternoon. The inward cargo consists of 300 cases cheese from the factories at Tillamook and some general freight. Returning the steamer will go out filled to the hatches with feed, merchandise, dry goods, furniture and in fact everything that enters in filling the demands upon the stores in the Tillamook country. The Elmore made a fairly quick trip this time but had a rough time of it coming out from Tillamook bay. She waited two days for calmer weather but finally stood out while the seas were still running very high. Captain Schroeder expects to start for Elmore tomorrow afternoon.

RAN INTO BIG STORM. French Bark Bretagne Loses Sails in Hurricane.

It took the French bark Bretagne 11 days to sail from the Golden Gate to the mouth of the Columbia river and Captain Henry says he had to fight hard for every mile. At one time the big windjammer was in the middle of a fearful hurricane and several sails were blown away before they could be taken in. The Bretagne arrived in the harbor yesterday afternoon under charter to the Northwestern Warehouse company

to carry a cargo of barley to Europe. She will be at anchor in the stream until arrangements to load her are completed. Captain Henry, who was here two years ago, came ashore this morning and renewed a large number of acquaintances.

BUILDS WRECKING BARGE. Well-Known Diver Will Increase Scope of Operations.

Fritz de Rock, the well-known diver, in building a large wrecking barge on the beach at the foot of Saylor street and it will soon be ready for launching. It will be the first craft of its kind built here. Equipped with pumps and derricks, it will prove of great value in case of accident to one of the mosquito fleet, because by the use of the equipment a sunken boat can be raised with little difficulty. The barge is 26 by 60 feet and very strongly constructed, heavy timbers being used throughout.

Mr. Bruce has been making Valparaiso his home since his departure from Portland about five years ago. His successor, Rev. A. E. Bernays, conducted the reception last night. Rev. Bernays left for Vancouver, B. C., last night on business in connection with the institute.

The steamer rolled and tossed about pretty lively and one of the women passengers got the idea that the last hour had struck. She ran into the social hall, sat down upon the floor and cried at the top of her voice for a life preserver. The stewardess and officers told her there was no danger, but no words would comfort her and so she was given a life preserver.
