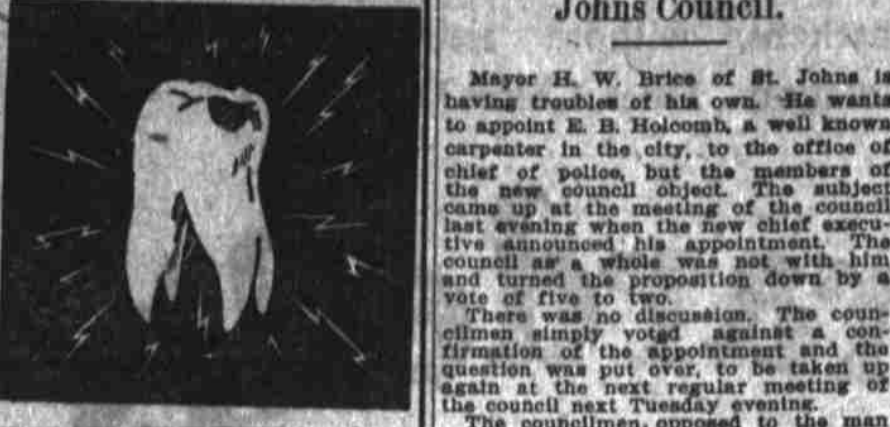

COMPLETE DETAILS OF REALTY EXCHANGE

Considerable opposition developed to this plan, the older members as a rule favoring the maintenance of two separate organizations in order to give more time to investigate the proposed merger and a postponement of final action was agreed upon.

It was announced that the realty board would go to Hood River on an excursion Saturday, May 9. Arrangements have been made for special rates on the steamer Spencer, and the Hood River Commercial club will arrange for the reception of the excursionists.
