

# PEOPLE TO ELECT BOSS REEVEN STATE

## Statement No. 1 Candidates Will Go on Ballots to Oppose Unpledged Ones Who Received Nomination for State Legislature at Primary.

Independent candidates for election to the legislature are being sought for in all of those districts throughout the state where men have been nominated who are opposed to the direct election of United States senators by the people and who have consequently refused to take the pledge of Statement No. 1.

In many districts there was no opposition before the primaries to the present nominees who did not sign Statement No. 1. It was seen from the outset that the machine leaders were making an effort to control the legislative districts, and it was decided to wait until after the primaries and secure independent candidates to enter the race for the election in the legislative districts. A clean cut fight between the Statement No. 1 and the anti-Statement No. 1 forces, as best interests of the state require, there will be no trouble in electing the independent candidates.

Plans are now being completed for a mass meeting to be held in Molokai, Hawaii for the nomination of two independent candidates to oppose the men nominated at the primaries and who are anti-Statement No. 1. In Washington county a move is also on foot to place Statement No. 1 men in the field for the June election. The same is true in Multnomah and Clackamas counties, where C. N. McArthur was nominated over W. C. Holt, the Statement No. 1 candidate. Similar movements have been inaugurated in Benton county and in Wheeler and other eastern Oregon counties.

In order that there shall be no mistake made by independent candidates who seek to enter the race in the different districts, those who have taken an interest in the matter have secured a form of petition, affidavit and acceptance, called for by law, and which has been passed upon by Attorney General Crawford and pronounced to be in accordance with the law. Those who become independent candidates will make no mistake if they follow these forms. The form of petition to be circulated for the purpose of securing signatures in sufficient numbers to entitle the candidate to be given a place on the official ballot, is as follows:

### DRAW LOTS TO DIVIDE FORNE

Four Sons of Prince Amadeo Will Leave Division to Chance.

Rome, April 23.—A novel plan for the division of the immense fortune of the late Prince Amadeo, one of the wealthiest men in Italy, has been agreed to by his four sons, who are the sole heirs. They have decided to divide their inheritance by lottery. They have divided the estate into four lots, and draw or choose their share by lot.

The lots are made up as follows:

First—Palaces in Turin, Venaria, and other places.

Second—Estate in Piedmont, Tuscany and Lomellina.

Third—Forests in Holland, Spain and Belgium.

Fourth—Coal mines in Belgium and sulphur mines in Spain.

### OFFICERS TAKE CRUISE ON LAND

Los Angeles Autoists Entertain Guests With Spins Through Country.

### FISH AND GAME GET PROTECTION

Oregon Association Passes Resolutions Restoring Old Laws and Adding Others.

The above were the recommendations made to the next legislature at a meeting of the Oregon Fish and Game association in the Chamber of Commerce building last night. The meeting was largely attended by enthusiastic sportsmen.

W. L. Finley, president of the Audubon Society, was present and his resolution giving a closed season for elk for a period of five years was passed. Tampering with the fish and game laws by the legislature has left the state practically without protection and it is the aim of the association to correct all the evils that exist.

To this end the association passed resolutions favoring the enactment of the fish laws existing prior to 1907, which had a closed season from October to April.
