

FAMOUS PLANS OF ABRAHAM FOR DARK

Beginning Has Been Made for Restoration of Port of Quebec—Already Large Steamers Sail From There.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Chicago, April 24.—Warm weather here has brought out spring fever symptoms a plenty, chiefly in inquiries concerning summer vacation arrangements and purchases of garden seeds. With no exposition on hand this year the tercentenary of the founding of Quebec by Samuel de Champlain, for which the Dominion government has voted \$300,000, seems likely to be accepted as a substitute for the Prince of Wales jubilee, the famous navigation and some soldiers—some 20,000 of them, the largest number probably that has assembled in old Quebec since the battle in which both the French and English generals lost their lives.

The celebration will witness the transformation of the famous plan of Abraham, now decreed by factory and mill, into a national park and also will mark the consolidation of two distinctly Quebec railways as part of the Canadian Northern, having connections from tidewater to the Rocky mountains.

A beginning has already been made in the restoration of the port of Quebec to its former greatness on the St. Lawrence. Already the Dominion steamers in the Atlantic fleet trading to Canada sail from Quebec instead of Montreal, the channel which is scarcely deep enough for the vessels of heaviest draught, and the opening of the new branch of the Canadian Northern-Quebec railway will be the first distinct step towards making Quebec the terminal shipping point of this, the second of Canada's transcontinental railways. Both the provincial governments of Quebec and Ontario have appropriated \$100,000 each in addition to the Dominion's \$100,000 to the occasion. It is proposed by the states of New York and Vermont to celebrate the discovery of Lake Champlain next year. A committee appointed last year by the New York state government to make preparations for this.

"The bucketshop," he added, "charges for a service when no service is performed; it merely weaves its web and watches for its victims. It is a gambling contrivance pure and simple. It is thoroughly demoralizing to industrial and mercantile life. It pollutes everything it touches and taints everybody with whom it is in any manner identified. It is insidiously poisonous and undermining and is at war with every legitimate industry and every principle of mercantile life. It is a scheme for betting upon quotations under the flimsy guise of commercial transactions. A bucketshop takes one side of the bet and its customer the other. If the customer wins, the bucketshop must lose. If the bucketshop makes money, it must follow that the customer loses money. To put it in another way, it is for the interest of the bucketshop proprietor that his customer lose money. It is for the interest of legitimate merchants that their customers make money. The profits of the bucketshop are derived from the losses of their infatuated customers. The impoverishment of their customers means the wealth of the bucketshop; and yet, strange to say, knowing this, their patrons eagerly enter the unequal contest. The bucketshop bears the same relation to legitimate commercial bodies that a counterfeit bears to a genuine bill. In contradiction from the bucketshop stand legitimate commercial exchanges or boards of trade.

Washington, April 24.—President Roosevelt has made up his mind to have a big game hunt in South Africa next year, unless unforeseen circumstances prevent. He has talked enthusiastically on the subject with his visitors recently.

His plan is to sail for an English port, but to make his stay in England brief and informal. Mr. Roosevelt may make a world tour, visiting the capitals of Europe to study foreign governments at close range. He may also, it is reported, visit Australia and New Zealand. But his one definite plan is South African big game shooting, and it will take a radical reason to keep him away from that.
