

OUR DAILY BREAD.



Summer fruits will soon be shown in the local markets and it's time to start your appetite for strawberries. Strawberries from California have been with us for some time, but it was not until the present week that the price danced within reason and at this time the average pocketbook is opening to secure a box or two. Fine quality is shown by the berries at this time. It is stated that Oregon berries will soon be with us.

Berries are ripe and will soon be with us. The other day the first shipment was made from California to the east and sold at a profit. Unless weather conditions show a radical change the cherry crop will be heavy in Oregon—say in fact, the prospect for all berries in this territory.

The other day a full car of Mexican tomatoes arrived in the Portland market and because of the fine color the "toms" sold quite readily in the retail shops.

Asparagus is quite plentiful everywhere and prices are sliding downward and are at present low enough to allow almost anyone to have a few "measles" of this delightful spring tonic. This week a large per cent of the supplies came from local ranches, and for that reason the grass is fresher and more tender than former arrivals.

Cauliflower has been quite cheap of late, considering the earliness of the season, but supplies are now getting low locally and this will force the price higher.

A first-rate apple dumpling is the queen of desserts at a family dinner. What to eat gives directions to allow baked apple dumplings of the old-fashioned kind.

Materials: Two cups flour, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, one teaspoonful salt, one tablespoonful butter, one tablespoonful lard, one cup milk, cinnamon, brown sugar, three large tart apples chopped.

Way of preparing: Sift the flour, baking powder and salt together. Work into these the butter and lard. Then use the milk and combine all these ingredients into a dough. Place on the molding board and roll to a thickness one-half an inch thick and longer than wide. Brush it with melted butter and sprinkle thickly with brown sugar and cinnamon. Cover with the chopped apples and roll up as you would a jelly roll. Then cut into 12 equal slices.

Materials: One cup sugar, one tablespoonful butter, one tablespoonful flour, one-fourth teaspoonful salt, one and one-fourth cups hot water, one-half a lemon sliced.

Way of preparing: Mix the sugar, flour and salt. Place in a small saucepan and add the butter, lemon and water. Stir until boiling. Cook four minutes. Then pour one-half of it over the raw dumplings. Pour the other half over after they are taken from the oven.

Fowl remains so high that few of the smaller markets have adequate supplies these days. Spring chickens were never in such small supply at this time of the season as this year, and therefore prices are holding high in the air. Ordinary chickens are in the market, as are freshly killed turkeys. The latter are scarce everywhere in the country.

Eggs are holding quite firm in the retail shops because of the high prices.

DAVIDOR SLAPS BACK AT FORMER ASSOCIATES

Deposed Agent of Telephone Company Files Damage Suit for \$100,000.

Suit for the recovery of \$100,000 damages from Louis J. Wilde, the Portland Home Telephone company, H. J. Meagher, C. E. Wagner and A. L. Hayes was filed in the circuit court this morning by Samuel V. Davidor. The suit is one of the results of the recent split up in the Washington Home Telephone & Telegraph company of which Davidor was the head.

It is claimed by Davidor in his suit that he is the victim of a conspiracy to ruin his business and to secure valuable telephone franchises controlled by him and his company in various Washington cities, including Chehalis, Vancouver and Centralia.

He claims that the Northwestern Long Distance Telephone company and the Washington Home Telephone & Telegraph company owned franchises in Washington that he had secured and was in order to wrest the control of the latter company from him and to secure its franchises that he had secured.

The suit characterizes the articles as "false, malicious and scandalous" and asserts that the same were secured through publication induced Gregory E. Matlen to file suit against the plaintiff Davidor in the circuit court and also caused his arrest on a charge of larceny. He claims that when the district attorney later looked into the charges he found them to be utterly false.

Besides all that he claims that the defendants forced him to relinquish valuable contracts with the Washington Home Telephone & Telegraph company and sundry other enterprises. All in all he wants \$100,000 from his alleged defrauder. The suit was filed this morning by R. A. Wade, D. J. Haynes and Lewis C. Garrius, who however, assert they have not succeeded. E. J. McAllister as Mr. Davidor's regular counsel.

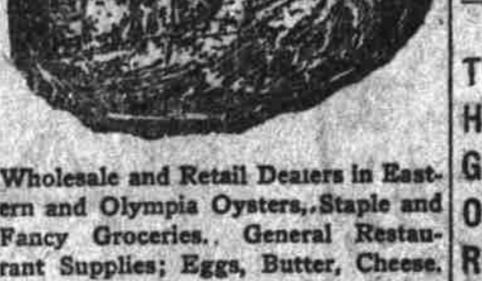

Montana Librarians.

Bozeman, Mont., April 24.—The Montana Library association began a two-days' meeting at the college here today with a good attendance of members. Several addresses were delivered, but the greater part of the day was devoted to an inspection of the various college departments and the fish hatchery. The real business of the meeting, including the election of officers, will be transacted tomorrow.

Secretary Root to Speak.

Washington, April 24.—Secretary of State Elihu Root has accepted an invitation to deliver the chief address at the second annual meeting of the American Society of International Law, which he will address in this city today. Mr. Root has chosen as his subject, "The Sanctions of International Law." Other topics that will receive attention at the two days' meeting are the advisability of making violations of treaties a federal offense, arbitration at the second Hague peace conference, the codification of international law and the organization, jurisdiction and procedure of an international prize court.

Banking and Finance were A. E. Padgett of Edgerfield, W. F. Stevenson of Chehaw, W. J. Brown of Florence, Wilson G. Harvey of Charleston and William A. Law, vice-president of the Merchants' National Bank of Philadelphia. The convention is to close this evening with the election and installation of new officers.
