RELIEF TRAINS SENT TO STRICKEN DISTRICT

DETERMINED TO SEE THE BIG SHIPS

Astoria Chamber of Commerce Charters Two Vessels and Will Meet Battleships Off Mouth of Columbia River.

Portland Business Men Invited to Take Part in Novel Excursion—Boats Will Follow Warships for Some Distance.

An exceptional opportunity to view the entire battleship fleet on its way from San Francisco to Puget sound will be afforded Portland and Astoria people through an arrangement that is being made by the Astoria chamber of commerce. Two ships are being chartered to carry excursionists out to meet the fleet and sail with it some hours, permitting not only a view of the fleet at close quarters, but under full steam in the open ocean.

SUSPECTED DYNAMITER CAPTURED

Man Seen Skulking Near Home of Former Supervisor Gallagher Short Time Before Explosion Is Under Arrest.

Police Refuse to Tell What They Have Learned From Prisoner but It Is Believed That They Have Strong Evidence of Guilt.

Oakland, Cal., April 25.—In the city prison is one of the two men who were seen skulking along Nineteenth avenue with a mysterious package in his arms a few moments before the home of W. H. H. Schenk, 1379 Nineteenth avenue, in which lived Supervisor James Gallagher and his wife, was shattered by a bomb last Wednesday night. The importance of this man's arrest, whose identity is kept a close secret by the police, overshadows any steps heretofore taken by the sleuths in the case. It is whispered that the suspect is closely connected with the crime and through his capture the local detectives have hopes of getting at the very fountain head of the conspiracy to rid the community of James Gallagher.

KAY GIVES WAY TO DR. J. N. SMITH

Deal Reported to Have Been Perfected by Which State Senator Relinquishes His Desire to Become President of Senate.

Arrangement Said to Have Been Made at Time of Fulton's Visit to Salem—Jones Is Slated for County Chairman.

THREE MILLIONS IN PROPERTY DESTROYED

Tornado Swept From Gulf to Great Lakes. Thirty Villages Levelled in Louisiana—The Dead Will Reach Two Hundred and Fifty.

Atlanta, April 25.—State troops have been sent to the scene of yesterday's storm, the damage from which is much greater than was at first estimated. Special dispatches from Louisiana report that it has been difficult to get relief trains to the devastated country and that the wounded and shelterless are suffering intensely. Every effort is being put forward by the railroads to get the trains through. Many of the militiamen at points close to the stricken villages, made forced marches with tents and supplies and thus gave considerable relief to the sufferers.

ROOSEVELT LOSES HIS FIGHT

Senate Defeats Piles' Naval Bill Amendment—Reconsideration Demanded and Request Is Granted—Killed Without Revision.

Washington, April 25.—President Roosevelt has apparently lost his fight for four instead of two new battleships. The end of his strenuous efforts in this direction came today when the senate defeated Senator Piles' amendment to the naval bill providing for four ships. The senate killed it without revision. Senator Piles was not present when the vote was taken. When he entered an hour ago, his amendment had been defeated. He immediately demanded a reconsideration and the request was granted.

COSSACKS ROUT PARROT SAVES OWNER'S LIFE
