George W. Douglas, 215 Worcester building, has an interesting timber announcement in today's Journal. The board of directors of the Northwest Exploration & Development company, which controls the tract of 4,000,000 feet of select hardwood timber, has authorized the sale of a limited number of shares of stock at 20 cents per share, par value \$1, for the purpose of installing a plant of sufficient capacity to meet the demand of the market. Highly polished samples of the wood cut from the tract and cruises reports are on hand at the office of Douglas, 215 Worcester. The timber is on the Pacific coast and consists of mahogany, lignum vitae, ebony, cedar, rosewood, all most used for the manufacture of high-grade furniture, hotel and office fixtures, pianos, etc.

ninth report, last September, the executors of the estate had overdrawn their account by \$26,991. Now they have a balance of \$48,515. The receipts have been \$518,131 and the disbursements \$477,314. The estate is in charge of Emma L. Corbett, executor, Henry L. Corbett and Elliott R. Corbett.

Plans are being drawn for a factory building to cost \$60,000 for the Campbell Automatic Gas Burner company, which will be erected on a half block of ground in the East Portland factory district.
