### \$500 ROLL GONE; LOST OR STOLEN?

Visitor to City Mystified by Sudden Disappearance of His Money.  
 Five hundred dollars in currency was either picked up in Third street between Oak and Stark this morning, or it was stolen from the pocket of Walter Linnette of Bridal Veil, to whom it belonged, as he was ascending to the seventh floor of the Chamber of Commerce building in an elevator.  
 The money was in greenbacks of the denominations of \$1, \$2, \$5, \$10 and \$20. Linnette received the currency from the United States National bank, Third and Oak streets, a short time after it opened this morning, and went as one to an office on the seventh floor of the Chamber of Commerce, less than one block distant. When he reached the office he discovered that the money was missing.  
 Linnette says that as he was wearing an overcoat he reached down inside of it to the inside pocket and deposited the roll of bills. He fully believed the roll was safe in the pocket, but there is a possibility the bills never reached the pocket, but slipped through to the pavement, where they lay ready for the hand of the first observant person who passed by.  
 While going up in one of the elevators on the Third-street side of the office building he remembers that a man dressed in gray brushed by him to reach the cage door. As the elevator was crowded at the time, however, the identity of the other passenger in the cage cannot be learned. Linnette is not sure which of the two elevators on that side of the building he entered.

### EXPECT GUSHER IN POLK COUNTY

Oil Company Finds Petroleum in One Well—Work Starts on Another.  
 Members of the Polk County Oil company, which is composed of Portland business men, are expecting a great strike on their property within a few weeks and predict that a new commercial field will shortly be opened in the vicinity of Portland that will take position among the leading industries of the state. Already one well has been opened, but through an accident had to be abandoned and a new one started.  
 This well is now down to a depth of between 100 and 200 feet. The old well went to a depth of 850 feet when oil was found. Natural gas was also found and it is expected that both oil and gas will be found in commercial quantities.  
 In speaking of their property, which contains 325 acres and lies directly on the Southern Pacific railroad about three and one half miles from Dallas, representatives of the company said today:  
 "Some time ago in order to ascertain whether or not petroleum oil could be discovered on the lands in question considerable drilling was done. Oil, also gas, was found, and reasonable indications that coal might also be found on these lands. At certain depths kieselite is found, and from tests made the finest kind of pottery ware can be manufactured from it. Also a high grade of pressed brick. Therefore we now know that the only prospective feature is as to the quantities of oil and gas we shall find."

### MANY DWELLINGS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Number Exceeds That of Any Period in the History of the City.  
 "Engineers and workmen are now busily engaged in drilling, and the work will be prosecuted as speedily as practical methods permit, and until the results we confidently anticipate are realized."  
 "Never before in the history of Portland have there been so many small buildings under construction as there are at this time," declared Contractor Charles S. Fisher. "By small buildings I mean dwelling houses of all sizes. I don't look for very much heavy construction this summer. Outside of the Christian association buildings, one hotel and half a dozen small business blocks, nothing in the line of heavy buildings may be looked for this summer. In fact, I don't look for an increased demand for office buildings, warehouses and large business structures until Portland has more manufacturing plants."  
 "This is the one great need of Portland. A large city cannot be built by putting up huge office buildings, hotels and business houses. The people must have permanent employment, and in order to supply this manufacturing plants must be established here."  
**Fulton Wants Battleships.**

 Washington, April 27.—Senator Fulton will speak in favor of four battleships late this afternoon, which program it is conceded will not go through. Practically all Pacific coast senators support the four battleship program.

### TRUST CONTROLS VOTING MACHINES

Three Million Dollar Corporation to Handle Entire Output of Country.

 San Francisco, April 27.—A \$3,000,000 voting machine "trust" is the latest monopoly. The Empire Ballot Machine company, embracing all the ballot machine companies in the United States is its name.  
 Every patent in any way affecting any part of these machines will be brought into the organization so that there will be only one voting machine purchasable in the United States.  
 President Lamb of the United States Standard, one of the concerns in the merger is the new head of the "trust" and Adam Andrews of San Francisco, is the vice-president. Heretofore there has been much rivalry and contention as to which is the best machine on the market. The combine does away with this, resulting in the manufacture of a machine in which all patents will be taken advantage of. A meeting of the directors of the "trust" will be held in San Francisco late today.
