FALLS 2,000 FEET TO EARTH

Parachute Fails to Open and Balloonist Is Severely Injured.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Fort Worth, Texas, April 28.—Although he escaped death in a miraculous manner when he shot a distance of 2,000 feet to earth, clinging to a parachute that refused to open, F. A. McCormick, swathed in bandages and barely able to move, declared today that he would make another ascension as soon as he could use his limbs. In view of thousands of spectators, McCormick yesterday ascended a distance of 2,000 feet in a balloon and then came down with his parachute. His progress downward was more thrilling than he had anticipated. The parachute refused to work properly, and his descent was almost as swift as it would have been if he did not have one. Once he turned a complete revolution, but he clung to the parachute. He struck the ground with terrific force and was picked up unconscious. Although his injuries are painful he was not fatally injured.

INDIANS' RIGHTS AS OREGON CITIZENS

Attorney-General Crawford Writes an Opinion in Response to Query From Klamath.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal, 367 State Street.)

Salem, April 28.—In a number of districts in Oregon the question has arisen as to what Indians are qualified to vote, and the election boards in the vicinity of Indian reservations have been confronted with the problem frequently. Roy R. Wise of Klamath has asked an opinion of Attorney General Crawford. Following is an excerpt from the attorney general's reply: "Indians who have received lands by allotment are subject to and have all the rights, privileges and immunities guaranteed by the laws of the state of Oregon, both civil and criminal. Over Indians not allottees the laws of the state have no effect except as to crimes and misdemeanors committed outside the reservation, or that part not yet allotted or thrown open to settlement.
