The Season's Last Pianola Recital

Eilers Piano House Arranges Exceptionally Fine Program for Last Concert.

BEULAH HAWKINS CRIES IN SLEEP

First Sign of Emotion in 84 Days Not Sign of Awakening, Doctors Say.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, April 29.—Mrs. Beulah Hawkins, the psychological marvel who has been in a cataleptic state for 84 days, wept today. Tears were forced through her closed eyelids down her cheeks, but aside from this first expression of her feelings since she entered into the cataleptic state, which has chained her since February last, no sign of intelligence nor of the agony which must possess her was given.

Doctors call her case one of cataleptic insanity and yet they agree that symptoms are present which would not be found in a typical case. The catalepsy is due entirely to a nervous affection which has not shattered her mental faculties.

All experiments and attempts to arouse the woman have failed. Strangely enough, however, her health is excellent and all functions except those governed by consciousness are perfectly normal.

KENTUCKY HATFIELD IN FIGHT ON TRAIN Ancient Feudist Annoys Passenger and Assaults Him When He Kicks on the Insult.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Montevideo, Wash., April 29.—Leisore Isenberg of Seattle was attacked on the train near Oakville Friday and would soon have been beaten to death if others had not interfered. It appears that Isenberg was riding on the train bound for Grays Harbor, and an Aberdeen man by the name of J. W. Hatfield was seated just behind him. Hatfield put his toes up between the cushions and kept annoying and tickling Isenberg, and when the latter resented the action Hatfield pulled a long revolver from his coat pocket.

Seeing this Isenberg caught his assailant's arm, but Hatfield, being larger and more powerful, kept beating a tattoo on the head of his victim. The blood streamed down over his head and coat, and John Larkin, who was sitting on the opposite side of the car, separated the two. The conductor telegraphed from Porter to Elms, and Deputy Sheriff John Rogers appeared at 11:00 to appear on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

It is believed that Hatfield's mind is damaged on account of melancholia caused by the death of his wife and children. Rogers was elated over his part in the affair, and he says Hatfield belongs to the Kentucky family famous for their history, some of whose members have settled in this neighborhood.

CHINESE MERCHANT COMMITS SUICIDE (United Press Leased Wire.) New York, April 29.—Long Wun Do, a Chinese merchant, well known on the coast, committed suicide here by jumping off the roof of a 66 foot tenement house. Do had been despondent over money troubles.

BAKER CITY SCHOOL DESTROYED BY FIRE (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Or., April 29.—Fire broke out in the school building which was used by the fourth and fifth grades of the Central school Monday night about 11 o'clock and the structure was so badly damaged that it will be a complete loss. The firemen responded quickly to the alarm and did such good work that only the roof of the building fell in. The walls were so badly damaged that they will have to be torn down and the whole structure rebuilt from the foundation.
