

POLITICIANS FLEE FROM GUATEMALA

(Dated From Lasso Wire.) Mexico City, April 28.—Advices received here today from Tapachula and other points near the frontier of Guatemala that scores of political refugees have fled into Mexico from Guatemala during the last few days and that a state of terror exists among the people who have been identified with the administration who are opposed to the Cabrera administration.

The Easter Bridal.

W HILE all the months of the year are open to the maiden contemplating matrimony there are two favorite seasons, the month of roses, June, and the early spring, or the season just following Easter. There comes another contingent of brides in the winter, at or near Christmas, but these are not so numerous.

The June bride is reasonably sure of pleasant weather for the honeymoon, that may be one thing that attracts, and there is a superabundance of blossoms for decorating the home or the church. The Easter bride has for her part the beautiful season of new life and hope, appropriate to the young people just entering the new estate, the awakening song of bird and the delicate, faintly colored flowers of spring.

As to the choice between church and home wedding, individual taste and the strength of the family purse, well as the obligations to more or less lengthy list of friends must be taken into account.

If it is to be a home wedding the largest first-floor room is chosen for the ceremony. Most of the furniture is removed and decorations, simple or elaborate, make it beautiful. A canopy of plants, or a background of palms with a floral bell makes a pretty feature and can be arranged without much trouble. By the way, a floral bell is not difficult to make. A large wire lamp shade makes a good foundation. The frame may be covered with sword ferns or cedar or moss, upon which the flowers are to be placed should be made only a little while before the ceremony so that it will not wither. At this season a ball of white silences would be appropriate. Streamers of gauze, white or pink, add much to the decorative effect.

It is not obligatory for the bride to wear orange blossoms, in fact, that time-honored custom is falling somewhat into disuse, since its real meaning, a promise of fertility, has become more generally known. Instead the Easter bride will probably choose a few white roses, or lilies of the valley against their own leaves for her bridal coiffure.

And this is the place for another word of advice to the bride. Don't be persuaded to let some aspiring friend or a fashionable hairdresser arrange your hair in some unwonted fashion for your wedding. It will give it a new angle, twist into it artificial curls or curls, marcel it beyond recognition or otherwise make you unrecognizable. It is not wise for the ceremony of marriage to be sufficiently solemn and frightening to drive the usual color from the bride's cheeks and to make the uniform whiteness of her garments unbecoming, without the additional touch of having her hair done in an unaccustomed style.

The soft, clinging lines of the empire style are being chosen quite generally now for the bridal robe. It is always prettier for the bride to wear white, even if she does not care for the long train and veil of custom. Tradition, however, sets its approval upon the sweeping train and the filmy veil, and on this occasion of such momentous significance there is a satisfaction in having done the proper thing.

There are many considerations which combine to make a church wedding desirable. For one thing there is no more sacred and more momentous occasion than a marriage. It cannot be made too holy and binding. It is not a thing to be done with any whim or caprice, only, and in the fear of God, and in the church where the girl has grown to womanhood, where the sacred thoughts of her whole young girlhood have clustered, in the most fitting and appropriate place for her marriage. And a church wedding need not necessarily be a matter of great expense.
