

APRIL EXPORTS SHOW UP WELL

Portland Disposes of Home Products at Large Aggregate Value.

WHEAT HOLDS FIRST POSITION ON LIST

Foreign Shipments of Lumber Larger Than for Several Months in Past, but Coastwise Shipments Continue Light—Europe Takes Most Wheat.

Portland did a brisk export business during the month closing today, a month ordinarily not expected to make a very brilliant showing in the line of wheat shipments. It was an exception this month, however, for close to 11,000,000 worth of wheat was set afloat here. By far the larger portion of this quantity went to Europe, less than 100,000 bushels going across the Pacific to Japan or China.

Lumber shipments were heavier than for some time, 13,468,863 feet having been sent away, 12,468,863 feet going foreign and 6,224,724 to domestic ports. It was thought the Norwegian steamer Elva would be ready to clear before the end of the month, but it now appears that she will not be ready until tomorrow morning. She is at the mills of the Portland Lumber company and will leave for Fremantle, Australia, with 2,800,000 feet.

Shipping in general was very active during the month, 51 vessels having entered the port and 59 having cleared since the first. Following is a list of cargoes cleared for foreign ports:

DEMAND LOCAL OPTION VOTE IN 11 DISTRICTS

Six Ask for Decision on Liquor Traffic Within City Limits—Five Are for Precincts Outside—The Battle Wages Around Petition to the Court.

Eleven petitions calling for submission of the third question at the June election have thus far been filed with the county clerk. Six of these are for precincts or combinations of precincts in the city of Portland, and five for outside districts. The east side and Gresham precincts are the storm centers.

Friday will be the last day for filing local option petitions. Thirty days before the election is fixed as the last date for presenting them. The county court then has 10 days in which to pass on mooted questions and place in the hands of the sheriff the notices calling the elections.

The greatest interest hinges on the petition backed by the prohibition element for submitting the question to wet or dry to the entire east side, precinct 51 alone excepted. Against this petition a hot legal battle is being waged, and the opposing clans claim that they have a "clinch." They express great confidence that the county court, when it settles the problem on May 7 will be compelled to declare that such an election would be invalid.

Stump in the Way.

If their position is sustained and the dry advocates fail to file other petitions before Saturday they may find themselves at a disadvantage, as the liquor interests have several petitions on file to submit the question on the east side, and the drys are apparently relying on the general east side plan, which may be knocked out at a point.

This point concerns the inclusion in the east side general petition of territory that voted dry at the city election last year. It is claimed that this cannot be done, the law for-

THREE COASTERS ARRIVE.

Steamer Alliance Reports Whales Assembling Off River Again.

Three coasters arrived here during the night and this morning, all of them reporting fine weather and good business. The Alliance, Captain Olson, from Coos Bay, brought a full list of passengers and several hundred tons of freight, including a large quantity of match wood. The Eureka, Captain Norron, got in from Eureka, via Coos, and the Sue H. Elmore, Captain Schroeder, got in from Tillamook.

The Alliance brings the report that whales are again beginning to make their appearance off the mouth of the river. Large schools of them were seen this trip. The Leviathans evidently following smaller fish now entering the bays and rivers. Some of the whales were of immense size.

The steamer Breakwater, Captain Macginn, left last night for Coos Bay, carrying 400 tons of freight and 90 passengers. The Eureka leaves for Coos Bay tomorrow afternoon, and Saturday night the Alliance sails for Coos.

PRECAUTION AGAINST FIRE.

No Smoking on Coasting Steamers During Working Hours.

Smoking will no longer be tolerated during working hours on board vessels belonging to the Steamship Owners' association of the Pacific coast. The announcement was made here this morning upon the arrival of the steamer Alliance from Coos Bay.

The new order, but have agreed to abide by it since the officers are given none the best of it, the captain even being prohibited from puffing at a cigar while actively engaged in directing the movements of his ship.

The order was issued as a precautionary measure against fire, it having been discovered that more than 5000 cigarettes or cigars or even dropings from pipes, than any other causes, are the cause of shipboard fires. The strictest kind of precautionary measures have been taken against fires. It is said that three or four incipit fires on board vessels bring at their berths in this harbor during the past few months were due to cigarette smoking.

The order affects the longshoremen as well as the sailors in that no smoking is allowed on the wharf while the work of loading or discharging is in progress. Very few longshoremen have, however, been in the habit of smoking at work. Most sailors are inveterate smokers and without strict orders from the owners it would be difficult for the officers to induce them to discard the pipe, even when unloading gunpowder in the deepest hold of the vessel.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT.

The steam schooner Cascade is in the river to load lumber for San Francisco. Three oil carriers, the Maverick, Argyll and Anacostia, are on their way up the river today to discharge cargoes at the tanks at Linnton and Portsmouth.

The Norwegian steamer Hornelen left San Francisco yesterday for this port under charter to carry 1,600,000 feet of lumber to Panama.

The steamer George W. Elder leaves Martin's dock this evening for San Pedro and way ports.

The steamer Condor is due to arrive here this week from Yaquina with a cargo of lumber. She will take general merchandise for a return cargo.

The steamer Columbia will begin operations between Portland and Vancouver next Monday, making four round trips daily. She will land at the foot of Washington street, the Columbia is one of the fastest boats on the river.

The steamer Noma City was at Washington street wharf until noon today loading wheat for San Francisco. She will take a deckload of lumber at Linnton. The Washington is the first ocean-going craft to take cargo at Linnton.

The steamer Columbia, which came from Washington street, and it came about with wheat, for which room could not be found on the docks along the lower harbor, had been stored there during the grainhandlers' strike.
