

### SAVE BISHOP FROM KOREANS

### Federal Authorities Discover Plot and Take Missionary to Oakland.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, April 29.—Warned that a number of Koreans in San Francisco were preparing to assassinate Bishop Merriman Colbert Harris upon his arrival here today upon the liner Korea from the Orient, the Surveyor of the Port Wood, accompanied by a number of other federal officers and members of the local police force, met the steamer upon its appearance in port and placing the divine aboard the revenue cutter Golden Gate, caused his removal to Oakland.

### JAMESTOWN BUILDINGS DESTROYED BY FIRE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Norfolk, Va., April 29.—Several colonial buildings in Jamestown, as the result of a fire which swept part of the grounds last night, these buildings made up the arts and crafts village. Among the structures destroyed were "Ye Old Tyme Tavern" and the Phillips reservation. The fire was put out as it was approaching dangerously close to the exhibit palaces. The building representing the state of Michigan was slightly damaged. The total damage was not great.

### CHARGED WITH THEFT FROM RAILWAY DEPOT

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dallas, Or., April 29.—C. R. Miller, a former resident of the Dallas, has been arrested by Sheriff Chrisman and Constable Harper at Hood River on the charge of stealing from the Great Southern depot here. The alleged misdeed, it is claimed, was done last summer and the goods stolen consisted of about three days' worth of tools and other articles. The warrant has been in the hands of the officers for a long time, but Miller's whereabouts was unknown.

### INDIAN REVIVAL ON UMATILLA RESERVE

Pendleton, Or., April 29.—One hundred Indian teepees are now erected on the camping ground at the Presbyterian Indian mission on Umatilla, six miles southeast of this city, where a great Indian revival is being held by the Umatilla. Parties of Indians from the Yakima, Nez Perce, Flathead, Blackfoot, Warm Springs and other tribes are arriving and the attendance will reach a high point, it is believed. Ten native ministers will preach to the assembled tribes and a 15 days' meeting will be held.

### SIMS' CHECKS SAID TO BE VALUELESS

T. W. Sims, a cement contractor, was arrested this afternoon by Detectives Hallyer and Maloney, charged with having passed a number of worthless checks. Formal complaint will be filed against Sims later in the afternoon.

### Mississippi Teachers at Jackson.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Jackson, Miss., April 29.—Hundreds of teachers and other visitors are here for the annual convention of the Mississippi Teachers' association, which will hold forth in the Century theatre during the remainder of this week. The program for the initial session tonight provides for the usual addresses of welcome and responses, and the annual address of the president. The forenoon of Friday and Saturday will be devoted to departmental meetings, and the afternoon and evening to general sessions.

### O. A. C. Society Debate.

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### PHILLIPS SEES PIG IN THE FENCE

### Electrician Contends Campbell and Roberts Had Ulterior Motive in Report.

Further investigation of the conditions reported upon by Chief Campbell and Deputy Fire Marshal Roberts revealed the fact that School Electrician Phillips' contention that the fire officials were attempting to make capital out of their report seems well-founded. Phillips says that Campbell and Roberts took advantage of the Collinsgrove disaster to play up every little defect to prejudice the public mind.

Phillips says that nearly everything reported upon unfavorably by the fire officials prevailed last year, and had the officials really wanted the defects corrected they could have reported upon them last year. Some sort of a report was made last year by Campbell and Roberts and should have been filed with the city auditor, but Phillips says that he has been unable to find the report in the city auditor's office.

**Advised Changes.** Campbell and Roberts reported as follows on the Irvington school: "Electrical system should be remodeled at entrance of service. No proper main line switch and fuse at entrance of light system, and connections at entrance of light system are exceptionally dangerous and poorly made. No approved main-line switch and fuse at meter for motor circuit. Basement and motor wires lay in close proximity to pipes in basement."

As soon as Campbell and Roberts learned of the statement issued by the underwriters, they made another investigation of the building and found that a meter had been installed in their ignorance of how such meters are installed they immediately thought that Phillips had placed the meter in the building. Roberts at once issued a statement to a daily paper, in which he said:

"We were somewhat surprised to find the meter in place when we went to the schoolhouse, after Mr. Phillips made such strong criticism of our report in regard to this matter. The meter had been left out of the building ever since it was erected nearly two years ago, although electricity was used in the building for various purposes. We are gratified with the matter, as Mr. Phillips has done just what we wanted him to do by placing the meter."

Phillips said in regard to the D. P. Thompson school where Campbell and Roberts reported that a cabinet box was not lined that this condition is true. This box connects the circuits in the assembly room and these lights have been used about 12 or 15 times in the past six years. When the lights are on the entire box is cut off close to the meter by a main line switch. Phillips will begin rewiring this building within a week.

**Should Tear Down Building.** In regard to the report of the fire officials on the manual training school at the D. P. Thompson school, Phillips pointed out that the manual training department is in a separate one-story building about 150 feet from the main building. Phillips said that if the fire officials wanted to make a fair report they should have reported that the building be torn down and a new one built. Only 24 boys can work in the building at one time, and so far as they are concerned the danger from fire would be very slight.

Campbell and Roberts reported at the Shaver school as follows: "It is claimed in this school that the electric bells for fire purposes are not large enough to be heard throughout the building. A fire drill was sounded at the school yesterday afternoon by the electric bells, and in less than a minute the boys who search the building for any one who may have remained inside reported back to the principal that everyone was out. Campbell and Roberts did not take time to have a fire drill to examine whether the bells were large enough to include the statement in their report."

**Will Eliminate Delay.** He said that the tramping of those who had heard the bell, however, would great the intelligence of the alarm to the others and that the delay thus occasioned would not be greater than five seconds. The object in placing larger bells will be to save even this delay.

At the Ockley Green school Campbell and Roberts reported a pushing broken wire at entrance of motor circuit. "This was found to be correct, but the inspectors did not add that even though the pushing is broken the wire does not come in contact with the woodwork. Phillips pointed out that the real danger at this point was the fact that the wires are pushed into the woodwork and the insulation and short circuit the service. Phillips said that these wires will be placed in iron conduits. The bushing
