MUST WORK FOR BRYAN

Linn Democratic Convention
Instructs for Nebraskan
and for Chamberlain for
Senator in Resolutions
That Ring.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Albany, Or., April 30.—The most enthusiastic Democratic convention of recent years was held in this city yesterday. The delegates assembled from every precinct in Linn county and a total of about 100 Democratic workers were present. The principal business of the assembly was the selection of 11 delegates to attend the state convention to be held at Portland in June. Sixteen nominations were made and of that number the following will represent the Linn Democracy in the state meeting: M. A. Miller, F. C. Stellmacher, S. M. Garland, T. J. Munkers, W. R. Bilyeu, J. J. Whitney, C. Allingham, George Finley, L. A. Munkers, B. F. Pierce, J. D. Bennett.

and representative government as announced by Thomas Jefferson more than 170 years ago.

"We hail with joy the unmistakable signs of awakening among our fellow citizens to the imperative necessity of closer and firmer adherence to the long tried and imperishable principles embodied in the constitution and propagated by the teachings of true Democracy. We declare our abiding faith in the principles of what is known as Statement No. 1 and the direct primary and cordially endorse the Democratic ticket recently nominated in this manner in Linn county.

"We still hold to the doctrine that a public office is a public trust and that no man should be elevated to the high office of president of the United States whose reputation for unserving patriotism and fidelity to the greater principles of Jeffersonian Democracy do not stand unquestioned. And we believe that whoever is elected president at the approaching presidential election this year, should be a man possessing not only the qualifications above mentioned, but should be a man possessing the statesmanship of Thomas Jefferson, the iron will of Andrew Jackson and the patriotism and integrity of Washington and Lincoln. He should be a deadly enemy to the trusts and all kinds of monopoly, and a man who is in favor of the common people and who would favor the wielding of all the power of the courts in checking the encroachments of predatory wealth against the rights of the laboring classes throughout the country.

"Resolved, That the delegates this day chosen to represent Linn county in the state Democratic convention be, and they are, hereby instructed: "First—To use their earnest efforts to send to the Denver convention men who are known to be thoroughly in sympathy with the candidacy of William Jennings Bryan for the presidency. "Second—To use their earnest efforts to have sent delegates plainly instructed to vote first, last and always for Mr. Bryan; and be it further resolved, That it is the wish of this convention that Hon. M. A. Miller be chosen as a delegate to the Denver convention; and "Resolved, That we further endorse the able, efficient and honest administration of Governor George E. Chamberlain, and heartily endorse his candidacy for United States senator from Oregon; and be it further "Resolved, That we commend the candidacy of Judge J. J. Whitney for representative in congress and endorse him our hearty support."

Complete Harmony.
Most enthusiastic addresses were delivered by M. A. Miller, W. R. Bilyeu, S. M. Garland, Judge J. J. Whitney and Messrs. Pullpot, Munkers and Brandon, candidates for the legislature from Linn county.
The completest harmony prevailed throughout the convention and a general feeling was prevalent that the opportunity of a generation has presented itself to the Democratic party and a determination to make the principles of true Democracy victorious in the coming June and November elections.
An active campaign was planned and W. R. Bilyeu was chosen chairman of the Linn county Democratic central committee. F. J. Stites, secretary, and F. P. Nutting, treasurer.

Lane Wheat Ranch Sold.

FRISCO MEN PLAN ROAD

Papers Filed for Branch
Line to Connect With Big
System for Pacific Coast
—New York Capital Inter-
ested.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, April 30.—A great transcontinental railroad is to be the outgrowth of the Pacific & Southwestern railway which was recently incorporated at Tacoma for \$15,000,000. The project is backed by the Crocker and Stanford interests and their associates in the Pacific Improvement company of San Francisco. A. D. Shepard, general manager of the Pacific Improvement company, who has just returned from the north, where he filed incorporation papers and put surveyors in the field, today described some of the details of the project. He says the idea is to build east to Walla Walla and Spokane, and then connect near the eastern state line of Washington with another road, thereby forming a transcontinental line which will reach north and south to all important coast points.

CITY STREETS TO BE IN DARKNESS?

Mayor's Refusal to Sign
Warrant Gives Company
Power to Turn Off Juice.
Are the street lights of Portland to be turned off tomorrow night?
Or are they to burn on as usual?
Is Mayor Lane to sign the warrant for the bill for March of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, now in the hands of the executive committee?
Or is the bill, which has remained unpaid for 20 days, to linger in the pigeon-hole of the mayor's desk for some time to come?
If bills are not paid within a certain length of time, the company has the right to turn off the juice. It is the same with the city as with individual customers.
April 10 the bill was sent to the council for payment. Eight days later Mayor Lane refused to sign the warrant on the grounds that the bill was excessive. April 20 President B. S. Josselyn of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company wrote a letter to the mayor making a demand for the payment of the bill.
According to the contract between the street railway company and the city relative to the street lights, the company has the right to turn off the power within 10 days after the demand is made for the money.
Today is the day, 20 days having passed since the bill was presented and the demand being made 10 days ago. Mayor Lane isn't saying anything further, the bill is in the hands of the committee. President Josselyn isn't saying a word, either.
So the question stands: Will Portland streets be dark and gloomy tomorrow night, or will they be illuminated as usual?
