

LODGE TO BOOST TAFT DELEGATES

Will Work in National Committee, on a Proxy, in Contest Cases.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)
Washington, April 30.—An arrangement has been effected whereby Senator Lodge is to obtain the proxy of the national committee from the Philippines and go to Chicago as the personal representative of President Roosevelt during the period from June 3 to June 16, when the national committee is deciding contests, and will make a great effort to procure the seating of Taft delegates from the states from which contests come.
That much is known, and further, it is conjectured that Lodge, as a delegate from Massachusetts, will be the president's personal representative in the convention, the commission to procure Roosevelt's absolute refusal to accept a third-term nomination.
Senator Bourne said today:
"The fight this year is for the elimination of both Roosevelt and Bryan by the interests which have fought progressive policies so fiercely in the past. At this juncture the fight of the progressive Democrats represents a common one against the same foe in both parties, and it is necessary that either Roosevelt or Bryan be nominated in order than, whichever is elected, the reactionary forces may not regain possession of the government."

HAILEY'S MODEL FARM IS SOLD

Prominent Pendleton Men Buy and Will Divide a Famous Estate.

Pendleton, Or., April 30.—What had been planned by the late Judge T. G. Hailey to be the model dairy farm of eastern Oregon, has just been sold by the Hailey estate to Councilman Jürgen Mumm and ex-Mayor James A. Fee of this city. The Hailey dairy farm is situated on Wild Horse creek, six miles east of this city and consisted of 1,000 acres of diversified land including fine wheat land, alfalfa bottom land and orchard, grass and garden land. Wild Horse creek flows through the tract and along this creek Judge Hailey had laid the foundation for an ideal farm, to be divided into pasture and grazing lots for hogs and dairy cows. He erected a dairy barn with a capacity for 50 cows and 120 tons of hay and equipped it with every modern convenience. The farm was equipped with blacksmith shop, milk separators, power churn, chop mill, irrigation pumps and other features of a model farm, and it was the plan of Judge Hailey to furnish the city of Pendleton with milk, butter, cheese and cream from this farm as well as hogs and poultry.
For a time he kept over 60 Jersey cows on the farm and had about 300 head of blooded hogs there most of the time.
He successfully raised dry land alfalfa and was one of the first farmers in this vicinity to experiment with this crop. He also proved that hogs could be fattened on green alfalfa, and conducted some highly successful experiments along this line.
The entire tract has been sold this week, Mr. Mumm taking the 700 acres of wheat land and upland, while James A. Fee took the bottom land, alfalfa, orchards and buildings. The total price was \$73,750. Mumm paying \$17,000 and his 700 acres and Fee \$56,750 for the 300 acres in the bottom.

TWO MURDER CASES TO TRY AT HEPNER

Pendleton, Or., April 30.—There will be two murder cases, many minor criminal matters and a grand jury to occupy the attention of the circuit court at the May term at Heppner. It will be the first regular jury term there for a year, and the cases represent the accumulated business of 12 months.
Judge Bean and District Attorney Phelps state that they have just set cases for Morrow county, and the jury term will begin Monday May 11. The murder cases up for trial will be those of Webb McCallin, charged with killing Zappell, a butcher, and of Dan Doherty, who killed Oscar Allen in a Lexington saloon last fall.
Apparently the Doherty case will be hard fought. Judge James A. Fee has been retained to assist Redfield in the defense.
