

STATE LIBRARY PUBLIC BOON

School, Special and Traveling Libraries Show Astonishing Growth.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal, 267 State Street.) Salem, Or., May 2.—Some interesting information is contained in the annual report of the state librarian, which was presented to the library commission at its meeting this week.

An important part of the work of the state library is the assembling of special libraries on topics of public interest, which are loaned to high schools, universities, colleges and libraries for the preparation of debates.

The librarian's report on all matters of public interest, which have been found quite useful, besides many libraries on municipal problems, such as sewer construction, municipal ownership of public utilities, irrigation and kindred subjects.

Public School Purchases. For the public schools alone \$618,000 were purchased in 1907 at a total cost of \$15,000. In two years \$8,557 books have been supplied to the public schools.

Another big department is that of the traveling libraries. There are now 90 libraries in the state receiving these lists of 50 books each regularly.
