



The next year-he en-tered the regular army as captain, con-tinuing in the quartermater's depart-ment.

BOER LEADER IS NOT RAISING CORN FOR WAR

New York, May 5.—General Francois Joubert Pienaar, formerly a Boer leader and now a British subject, gave person-al assurance today that his mission to America is not to cloak plans for an armed invasion of Portuguese West Af-rica. When General Pienaar was conrica. When General Pienaar was con-fronted with evidence connecting him with activities secretly directed against Portuguese territory in West Africt he admitted that he had contemplated the organization of a force of adventurers to take possession of Angola but as-serted that he abandoned the idea. A few months ago because of representations from the British foreign office which refused to sanction his enterprise. General Pienaar added that no part of the money he is now raising in Amer-ica for the suppression of the slave trade in Africa will be diverted from its proper object.
