

E. H. MARTIN SUSPECTED

(Continued from Page One.)

Solomon told of his various transactions with Martin and said that he had dealt with him about 12 times and that Martin always called between 8 and 7 o'clock in the evening. He said that he was convinced Martin was a dangerous man. He said that Martin often betrayed himself and from his actions gained the belief that Martin would commit any crime. Solomon said that Martin would never allow himself to be crossed in conversation and that he would never allow anyone to gain a point in an argument. So positive was Martin in such affairs that Solomon said he was convinced that the man was a user of cocaine or some other drug. What led Solomon to this conclusion more than anything else was a statement made by Martin in the store when some old man came in who used snuff. Martin was in the store when the old man came in. Seeing the old man take a pinch of snuff Martin asked for some. The old man passed out the snuff with the remark: "See that old man, if he could not use snuff he would go crazy." "From that statement and after watching the man as I did, I was convinced that he was a 'dope fiend,'" said Solomon.

Martin Looked for Position.
That Martin was a brilliant man and one of splendid education at the city hall. Recently he passed fourth in the civil service examination. He weighed and measured. Martin was at the city hall the day before the announcement of the appointments was made by Mayor Lane. He supposed that he would be one of the successful appointees and when Mayor Lane announced on Friday morning that he had appointed others, he supposed that Martin became despondent which led him to commit the crime he did on the night of the day the announcement was made.

In an examination which Martin took for instrument man in the city engineer's office, the suspecting murderer received a grade of 98 per cent in trigonometry and solid geometry. He failed to pass the other requirements of the examination, however.

Thursday was the last seen of Martin at the city hall. He appeared there at that time and sought to have his name changed on his examination for instrument man. He failed to pass by a narrow margin and argued with Secretary McIntosh that the marking had been done improperly. Failing to accomplish this, Martin spoke about the position of city sealer of weights and measures. He talked to many persons about the building concerning it.

Martin was extravagant in his habits and spent his money freely. With an income of only \$90 from the city he purchased candy and passed it among the employees of the building. He had money he made, and was continually pawning articles of jewelry which he owned.

Pawns His Ring.
It is said that Martin pawned his West Point class ring with Uncle Myers on Third street. This ring cost Martin, as he explained to Solomon, \$135. He pawned it for \$50. The ring is described as a beautiful article of jewelry, bearing the class numerals '96,' the year Martin graduated, and set with precious stones. Martin pawned this article often, it is said.

Little has been learned about Martin's past history. He has been in Portland several years, and is said to be the son of a well-known detective who has been connected with the New York police for 20 years. Martin also sold employees of the city hall that he and his brother were appointed to West Point at the same time, the only case of two brothers being appointed from the same state to the military academy at the same time, according to Martin.

What has become of Martin is what concerns the police at this time. Whether he has committed suicide, hid himself away in the city or left for some other place are questions which the police are also wondering where the coat and vest Martin wore when he is supposed to have committed the murder lay. The discovery of the coat and vest would be looked upon as a valuable piece of evidence in locating the suspecting murderer. She was ill, but a short time.

Happened Last Week.
This happened just one week before Wolff was murdered and robbed, and it is believed by the officers at that time Martin was planning to rob somebody. Whether Martin had dealings with Wolff or not is unknown. No examination has been made of the books in Wolff's store. Times Martin assumed the name of S. A. Surfin in dealing with Solomon, but always gave the same address which is on the east side.

DETECTIVES ON GUARD AT THE MARTIN HOUSE

Detectives Jones and Tichenor guarded the Martin home all night. They were relieved this morning by Inskip and another detective. It was thought by the detectives that by some possibility Martin might return to the house. In the house this morning was Martin's sister, a trained nurse. She would not speak to the detectives and they had orders not to ask questions nor to answer anything she might ask. All night and all day the vigil is being kept, with a dry-eyed woman with a drawn face sitting by the window watching and waiting for—she knows not what.

Only this sister is staying at the house. Mrs. Martin and the other sister are absent, and if the detectives know their whereabouts they are keeping the fact strictly to themselves.

REWARD OF \$1,000 STANDS FOR FIEND WHO SLEW WOLFF

The county commissioners now have a standing reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of the murderer of Wolff. The commissioners followed the usual practice in requiring that a conviction shall be secured before the reward will be due. The offer is made in this case because it is considered to the public interest that such an atrocious crime shall not go unpunished if the expenditure of \$1,000 can bring the guilty to justice. Judge Webster declared that he believed the money would be well spent, and Commissioner Lightner and Barnes joined in this opinion.

MARTIN ALLEGED TO HAVE BEEN SLAVE TO THE OPIUM HABIT

Edward H. Martin is known to be addicted to the use of drugs, generally of opium. V. V. Eyston, a fireman belonging to hose company No. 2, recently saw him leave the back door of a Chinese laundry at the northeast corner of Second and Madison streets. It was all too evident from Martin's actions that he had been using opium.

Urged by curiosity, Eyston saw him board an east side car, and as the fireman was taking that car himself he followed him after he left it to the house which the Martin family has occupied since April 19.

REPORTING TO START HOLY WAR

England Wildly Excited Over News of Battles on Frontier of India.

London, May 5.—All England is wildly excited today over the news of what amounts to real war in India. Although the British forces won the first battles fought with the invading forces from Afghanistan, the invaders have not been driven back across the border and it is feared they will attack again, and that the English troops on the scene may not be sufficiently strong in numbers to withstand their onslaught.

The serious news regarding the situation in the north of India, as well as the Indian stocks on the stock exchange. Dispatches from Simla report that in the conflicts already waged, several hundred Afghans were shot down by the British troops who used machine guns with deadly effect.

Apparently the invaders are trying to start a "holy war" and an Indian all India. They are marching through the country with the fiery cross of Mohammedanism as their standard and making fanatic appeals to the populace. Heavy losses resulted in Monday's battle between Major-General Sir Willoughby and the rebellion. A dispatch, according to the latest advices from Simla.

ROOSEVELT'S AIDES WORRY FOR PRESIDENT

Executive Refuses to Solve Problem of Seating Convention Guests.

Washington, May 5.—How are 5,000 of the biggest men in the United States to be seated in a room that can't possibly seat over 500 people? How are 25,000 other of the big men of the United States to be convinced that they aren't entitled to seats with the ones who get them? Those are among the puzzles just now confronting the advisers of President Roosevelt in connection with the entertainment of the convention of governors of states, which will be held here less than a month hence. The difficulty isn't worrying the president; he is letting his social aides do the worrying. He is merely puzzled over the means of that his gathering is going to be a great success.

CLUMSY CRACKERS OPEN DALLAS SAFE

Dallas, Or., May 5.—The clothing store of P. A. Finseth, corner of Main and Court streets, was broken into and robbed some time Saturday night, the thieves securing \$20 from the safe. No one was hurt, and the robbery was not ascertained. Entrance was made by prying open a window in the rear of the building. The safe door was broken loose by some blacksmith tools, which were found this morning behind a building near by. The tracks made by the men, who were traced to the broken window to where the tools were left. The trail thence was obliterated.

HIGH PRIESTESS OF ANARCHY COMING

Emma Goldman, anarchist, will be in the city May 23 and will give a series of addresses, then at every evening and twice on Sunday. Her addresses are being engaged and no interference from the police is expected. Her subjects will be "What Anarchism Really Stands For"; Direct Action; Logical Method of Anarchism; Why Women's Suffrage is not the Answer; The Interpretation of two of Ibsen's dramas—"The Enemies of the People" and "The Pillars of Society." A debate with the Socialist party is also planned. It is expected that E. J. Lewis will be Miss Goldman's opponent.

ARCHIBALD BUTT TO BE PRESIDENT'S AIDE

Washington, May 5.—Captain Archibald W. Butt, who will take Captain Fitzhugh Lee's place as military aide to the president, is on his way to Washington from Havana. He was made a captain in the volunteer service in 1900 and assigned to the quartermaster's department. He has since interested the regular army as captain, continuing in the quartermaster's department.

The body will be buried by the lodge of Red Men.
