BEAVERS DROP OPENING GAME

Seals Simply Walk Over Northerners, Scoring Seven to One.

Over six thousand fans—the largest number that ever passed through turnstiles at a Portland ball game—saw the Beavers lose yesterday to San Francisco, 7 to 1. Every foot of space in the grandstand, bleachers and field was filled with enthusiastic fans, and when the teams trotted out on the field they were given an ovation.

When the oldest battery in the world sent on the field to pitch the first ball, six thousand throats roared forth a welcome. Judge Williams took his position in the box and Colonel McCracken with great glove, snark and protector stood behind the plate. Hildebrand of San Francisco was at the bat. After considerable signaling the octogenarian on the mound wound up his mighty arm and heaved the sphere at the home plate. The first ball went low, striking the ground halfway between the pitcher and batter. The colonel high signed the judge and there was a hurried counsel. After that the judge did better, but couldn't locate the plate very well.

FREAK ORDINANCE IS TO STOP RACING NEWS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, May 6.—Owing to a freak anti-racing ordinance, which became effective in this city on May 1, the sale of newspapers printing any entry list, tip or results of a horse race is prohibited, and as one result 50 per cent of the newspapers and publications of the world cannot be sold here. Prosecutor Thomas L. Woolwine declared today that the freak ordinance means business and that he will vigorously prosecute anyone who violates it. He also says that the telegraph which handles racing news may be cut off. "Our new ordinance says that any paper, no matter where it is published, cannot be sold in Los Angeles if it contains any racing news," said Woolwine. "The local news dealers must be careful. If they are not they will suffer for their carelessness in the police court."
