At a meeting of the University Park
Push club last night resolutions were
adopted favoring a municipal fighting
plant as advocated by Mayor Lane. Ar-
rangements for the Rose Festival were
left in the hands of the committee ap-
pointed to represent the club at the
meeting of the board of directors of the
peninsula next Monday evening. A
resolution was introduced asking the
council to change the name of the street
which bears the names of Pippin
on one end and Dawson on the other,
to Wilumbia avenue. A committee
was appointed to prepare a park
board and urge the necessity of im-
proving and beautifying Columbia park.

Members of the Oregon Tax Reform
association and their wives attended a
banquet at Watson's restaurant last
night, and exchanged ideas and planned
to push the work more actively than
ever from now until election day in
June, when their proposed measure will
be voted on. H. W. Stone presided and
called on a number for short toasts.
Who responded expressed satisfaction at
the progress the movement is making,
and a number volunteered to go out in
the state and address the voters where-
ever arrangements were made.

Effective May 7, 1908, The Portland
Railway, Light & Power company has
issued the following order, affecting
the Portland railway division only:
"Effective May 7, 1908, smoking on
closed cars of the street cars, on the
rear platform. Conductors will keep
the rear doors closed as much as pos-
sible and will not allow passengers to
stand on the rear platform to the extent
of blocking either the platform or the
steps, thus interfering with pas-
sengers entering or leaving the car."

A. F. Severance was acquitted on the
charge of violating the city plumbing
ordinance in Judge Bronaugh's depart-
ment of the city court yesterday after-
noon. He was accused of falling
properly to ventilate the plumbing in a
house on Chicago street. The testimony
showed that other men were engaged
on the work, which resulted from the
reconstruction of the house, and the
evidence being in the case was
appealed from the municipal court,
where Severance was fined \$50.

The Mount Scott Improvement associa-
tion held a routing meeting Monday
evening. The association's hall at
Arleta was filled to overflowing. Sat-
isfactory progress in the matter of se-
curing better electric light service for
the district was reported. More than
a new pole has been placed and the
company is going ahead rapidly with
preparations for the wiring of residences.

DOUBLE SOMERSAULTS FROM BARE GROUND
